Pt 4: Who's Your Family?

LifeGroup Discussion Guide

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OBSERVATION & INTERPRETATION

- [2] Pastor Dustin shared that in John chapter nine there was controversy as to who Jesus really was. The Pharisees witnessed Jesus doing miracles and made the argument, "This man is not from God, for he does not keep the Sabbath." What do you think Dustin meant when he said these Pharisees were home alone and didn't even know it?
- [3] Read together John 10:1-10. Remember, this is Jesus' response to those questioning if He is truly the Messiah. Why do you think Jesus chose this parable to respond to their accusations?
- [4] Read John 10:11-18 together as a group. From what Jesus is saying, what is the true test of the "Good Shepherd?"

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[5] Have you ever found yourself in a situation and believed you were fully committed, but when it came down to it, you were more of a hired hand than a *good shepherd*? If so, share your experience. How does the example of the Good Shepherd contrast with our commitment level?

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APPLICATION

[6] Finish reading John 10:19-21 as a group. Those in the crowd had a decision to make. We have the same decision to make. Based on the response from your *heart*, did you say that Jesus is the Messiah? Is it possible for our hearts to have "hired-hand" moments? What do we do in those situations?

REFLECTION

[7] The "Good Shepherd" could also be translated as more than good, even **beautiful.** Beautiful, because of the willingness of the shepherd to lay down his life for the flock. Jesus modeled this by taking on our sins, facing abandonment, and dying for them on the cross. An act of compelling, radical, beautiful love.

How would a non-Christian view your life group? Would they say what you do is "beautiful?" If so, in what ways? If not, how can you model the sacrifice of Jesus this Christmas season, and reach out to others to bring them into the "fold" and relationship with Him?

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
