Welcome

Liturgical Rhythms for Everyday Life

This prayer guide is offered with the hope that it will serve as a gentle companion in your walk with Jesus throughout the season of Advent.

This project is rooted in a simple conviction: we are formed not only by what we believe but by what we practice. The habits we keep shape our desires, our attention, and ultimately our lives. As a church, we believe the rhythms of gathered worship are meant to spill over into the week—becoming patterns that form us into the likeness of Christ.

Each day of this guide offers a liturgically inspired practice: the same rhythms we engage together on Sundays, extended into daily life. These aren't tasks to check off, but invitations to slow down, pay attention, and grow in communion with God over time.

The Scripture readings follow the Revised Common Lectionary Daily Readings used by churches around the world, with each Sunday page highlighting our sermon passages in bold. All Scripture is taken from the New International Version (NIV), 2011 edition.

This guide is meant to be flexible. Use it in the morning, evening, or whenever it fits naturally into your day. It can be used individually or with others. However you engage it, our prayer is that it leads you into deeper rest, attentiveness, and joy in God's presence.

O Come, Emmanuel

Advent, from the Latin *adventus*, means “coming” or “visitation.” As followers of Jesus, we live between two visitations—the first coming of the Son of God in Bethlehem and his long-awaited return. We wait for the “day of the Lord,” when creation will be restored, the dead raised, and all things made new.

Advent invites us into this holy tension between already and not yet. It is a season of darkness and longing—a time to name our need for God’s light. As the days grow shorter, we remember that we are a people waiting for the dawn, learning to hope in the One who has come and will come again.

The O Antiphons help give voice to this longing. These ancient prayers, dating back to the sixth century, each begin with the word “O” and a title for Christ drawn from Scripture—O Wisdom, O Lord, O Root of Jesse, and others—expressing the deep yearning of God’s people for the coming Messiah. They form the basis of the hymn O Come, O Come, Emmanuel.

In this guide, we’ll pray and reflect on one of the O Antiphons each day of the week, allowing these ancient words to shape our waiting and awaken our longing for Christ, the true Light of the world. Fun detail: when you take the first letters of each Latin title (Emmanuel, Rex, Oriens, Clavis, Radix, Adonai, Sapientia) in reverse order, they spell *Ero cras*—Latin for “Tomorrow I will come.”

A Note For Families

Walking in the rhythms of grace together

Advent is already full of small rituals—lighting candles, opening Advent calendars, gathering in the evening for something meaningful and fun. Consider letting this prayer rhythm sit alongside those existing practices. It doesn't need to be long or elaborate; simply turning toward God together, even for a few quiet moments, can become a steady way of shaping your family's life with Christ.

If you have young children, expect a bit of noise, movement, and laughter. That's part of it. Prayer with kids is rarely picture-perfect, and it doesn't need to be. What matters is presence, not polish. Over time, these simple habits create space for your children—and you—to grow in attention, trust, and love.

Beginning December 1, we'll highlight the daily readings from The Biggest Story: Advent Devotional. This can serve as your family's Scripture reading each night as you gather around the Advent wreath or calendar.

Here is one suggestion for using this prayer guide for family devotions. It offers a simplified version of the daily rhythm to make it more accessible for households with children:

CALL — Take a couple of deep breaths together and remember God’s nearness. A short call-and-response works well with children (for example, “The Lord be with you” / “And also with you”).

HEAR — Read one of the day’s Scripture passages or that day’s reading from The Biggest Story.

ABIDE — Sit quietly for a brief moment, sing a familiar song or the Doxology, or share one thing that stood out from the reading.

PRAY — Offer prayers as a family. You can use that day’s prompt, pray for people you know, or simply give thanks for the day.

RECEIVE — End with a blessing or the Lord’s Prayer. One family member may speak the benediction with hands raised while everyone else opens their hands to receive it.

Don’t feel the need to do everything or to do it perfectly. Start small, stay steady, and let these moments become a gentle way of keeping watch together for the coming of Christ—joining the rhythms that have formed the church across centuries.

Waiting

God's story has always been marked by waiting.

Abraham waited decades for a child. Joseph waited in prison for justice. Moses waited in obscurity before God called him. Israel waited—under slavery, in the wilderness, under broken leaders, and through long years of exile. Even after returning home, they waited again, longing for a word from the Lord.

Jesus himself spent thirty quiet years before stepping into his public ministry. The early church waited through persecution, suffering, and uncertainty. Waiting is not a detour in the life of faith—it is the path we've inherited.

Advent meets us right here.

It teaches us to sit in the dark without rushing to the light. To feel the ache of what is not yet healed. To name the longing without trying to fix it too quickly. Scripture shows us that God does not avoid our waiting—he uses it. He forms us there. He meets us there.

This is why the church has long called patience a holy virtue. Waiting stretches our trust, deepens our hope, and teaches us how to love God not only for what he gives, but for who he is.

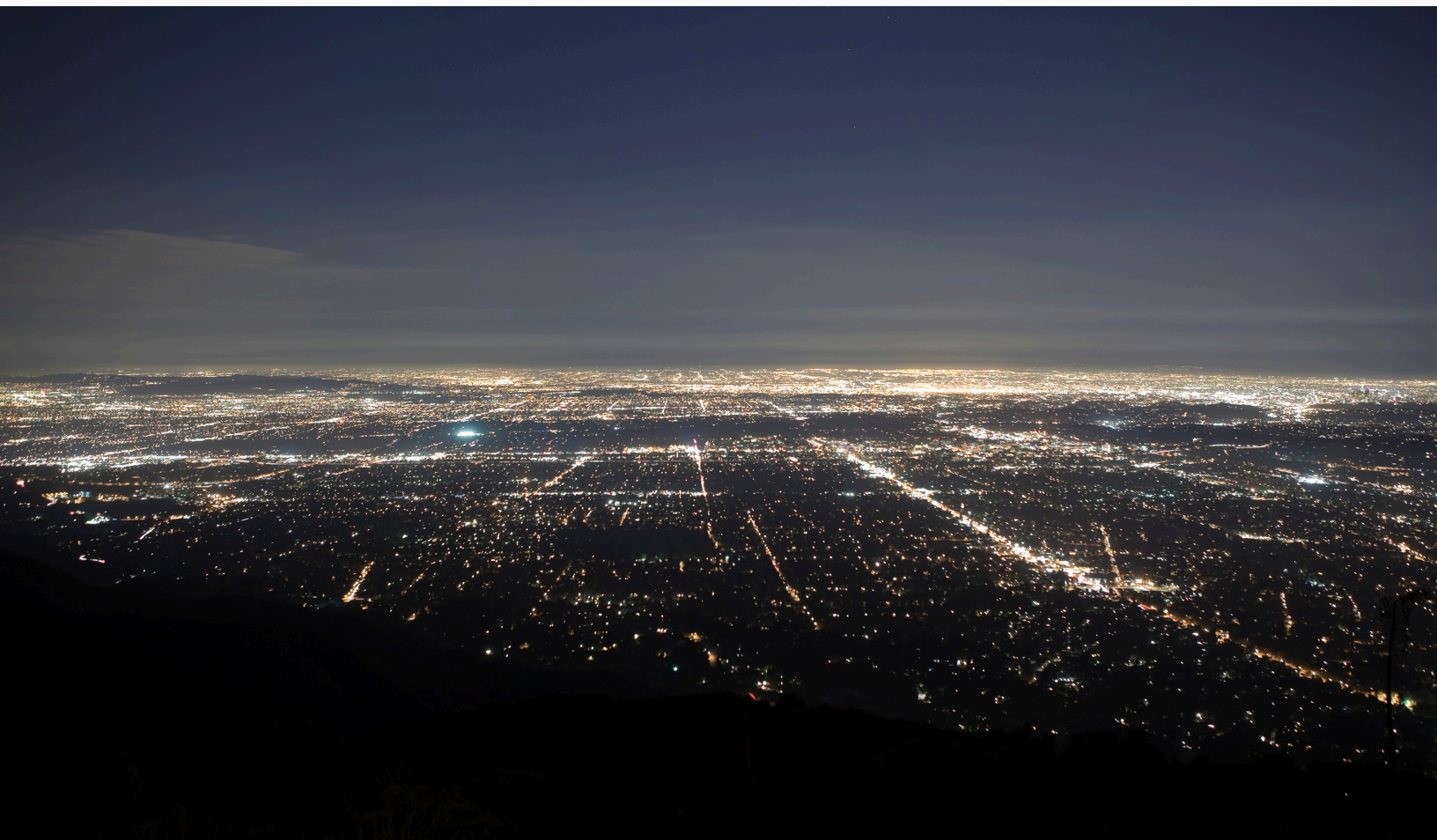
Here is a simple way to practice waiting in prayer:

Bring Your Longing— Bring before God what you are waiting for. A situation you long to see healed. A prayer that feels unanswered. A hurt that remains. Let yourself be honest.

Rest in God's Presence — Sit quietly before the Lord. Not to solve the problem, but to place your attention back in his hands. Scripture says, “Be still before the Lord and wait patiently for him” (Psalm 37:7). Stillness doesn’t fix everything—but it re-centers us in God’s presence.

Open Your Hands— Let your body help your soul pray. Open your hands, palms up, as a way of releasing control. Or rest in silence, remembering that God never slumbers or sleeps (Psalm 121:4). Recall how he has been faithful before—both in Scripture and in your own story.

Advent does not rush us past waiting. It invites us to remain there, trusting that God is still at work in the dark, and that light is coming.
