If you are visiting Cherry Creek today,

welcome and thank you for worshiping with us on this beautiful Easter morning.

Fifty days of Easter? What would we do? Celebrating Easter for fifty days is not duplicating Easter Sunday fifty times over. Rather, it's taking time to reflect upon and delight in the Truth of Easter and its implications for our lives: Christ is risen! He is risen, indeed! On Easter Sunday, we celebrate this Good News, yet the implications of the resurrection are more than we can adequately ponder on one day. The season of Easter gives us a chance to reflect more broadly and deeply on the multifaceted meaning of the resurrection of Jesus. What might this involve?

- We could meditate upon what the resurrection says about the character of Jesus Christ as the Righteous One of God (Psalm 16:10; Acts 2:25-28).
- We might ponder the fact that death has been swallowed up in victory (1 Corinthians 15:54-56).
- We could reflect upon the fact that the very power that raised Jesus from the dead is available to us today (Ephesians 1:15-23).
- We might think of how the resurrection of Jesus is a precursor to your own resurrection (1 Corinthians 15).

"All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name" was written by Anglican -turned-Independent Edward Perronet (1721-1792). His family was among the Huguenots who fled France under Roman Catholic persecution during the Reformation. They found safe harbor under the influence of John Calvin in Switzerland before settling in England. "All Hail" is the only of Perronet's hymns to find repeated use in succeeding generations. Its grand phraseology paired with its stately, lofty accompaniment put it among the ranks of the best English hymns ever written. This hymn closes our worship and provides us with a ceremonial picture. We sing about the King's coronation—the ceremony of Him receiving a crown as a symbol of His full and total authority. All hail King Jesus!

Series: Finding Jesus in the Psalms

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Mighty to Save is a powerful song for Christians to sing, especially on Sunday, the day commemorating Jesus' rising from the dead. Its strong emphasis on the power of the resurrection propels us into worship, praise, and mission. The song's chorus builds off the foundational statement in Zephaniah 3:17: "The Lord your God is with you, He is mighty to save." The context of this statement is one in which Israel is a weakened people, broken by their own sin and waywardness (certainly we can identify with that!). Zephaniah prophesied to this brokenness, telling of a time when God would eventually restore a remnant of His people to a future glory.
