

Isaiah Chapter 6



Isaiah's Call and Mission

¹In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord seated on a high and lofty throne, and the hem of his robe filled the temple. ²Seraphim were standing above him; they each had six wings: with two they covered their faces, with two they covered their feet, and with two they flew.

³And one called to another:

Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of Armies; his glory fills the whole earth.

⁴The foundations of the doorways shook at the sound of their voices, and the temple was filled with smoke. ⁵Then I said:

Woe is me for I am ruined because I am a man of unclean lips and live among a people of unclean lips, and because my eyes have seen the King, the Lord of Armies.



⁶Then one of the seraphim flew to me, and in his hand was a glowing coal that he had taken from the altar with tongs. ⁷He touched my mouth with it and said:

Now that this has touched your lips, your iniquity is removed and your sin is atoned for.



⁹Then I heard the voice of the Lord asking:

Who will I send? Who will go for us?

I said:

Here I am. Send me.



⁹And he replied:

Go! Say to these people: Keep listening, but do not understand; keep looking, but do not perceive. ¹⁰Make the minds of these people dull; deafen their ears and blind their eyes; otherwise they might see with their eyes and hear with their ears, understand with their minds, turn back, and be healed.



¹¹Then I said, "Until when, Lord?" And he replied:

Until cities lie in ruins without inhabitants, houses are without people, the land is ruined and desolate,

¹²and the Lord drives the people far away, leaving great emptiness in the land.

¹³Though a tenth will remain in the land, it will be burned again. Like the terebinth or the oak that leaves a stump when felled, the holy seed is the stump.



Here Isaiah now has a different vision that we will see has significant meaning.



Uziah was both a godly king and a long serving one (52 years on the throne) with an impressive record of making his nation secure, providing God's people with both political and religious stability.





In the year that king Uzziah died . .

Isaiah 6:9-10 is quoted once each by the four gospel writers—Matt. 13:14-15; Mark 4:11-12; Luke 8:10; John 12:40—and once by Paul in Acts 28:26-27.

All quotations of Isaiah 6:9-10 in the NT occur in the context of national Israel's unbelief in Jesus as Messiah and the kingdom of God He presented as "near" (Matt. 4:17). This passage is applied to Israel as a corporate entity even though some individual Jews were believing in Jesus.

When our world is in crisis, we need to see that God is seated on his throne. When life throws unsettling things at us tragic family news, shocking medical diagnosis, or whatever we are quickly reminded that we are not in control period we are not the king or queen of our own lives. That king is dead. But Long live the king. The Lord is on his throne.





... when our world falls apart, here are three things we need.

- First, we need to see ourselves in our sinfulness.
- Second, we need to experience the Lord's restoration.
- Third, we need to give ourselves to the Lord's mission

Now, let us look deeper into verse 13.

The figure is taken, first of all, from the terebinth or turpentine tree here translated the teil tree. That tree is an evergreen, with this exception, that in very severe and inclement weather it loses its leaves; but even then the terebinth tree is not dead. And so of the oak; it loses its leaves every year, of course, but even then it is not dead. "So," says God, "you have seen the tree in winter,

standing naked and bare, without any sign of life, its roots buried in the hard and frozen soil, and its naked branches exposed to every blast, without a bloom or a bud; yet the substance is in the tree when the leaves are gone. It is still alive, and it shall, by and by, in due season, bud and bloom; so," says he, "Nebuchadnezzar shall cut off all the leaves of the tree of Israel take away the inhabitants, only a tenth shall be left, and

they shall well nigh be eaten up; still the church of God and the Israel of God never shall be destroyed; they shall be like the terebinth tree and the oak, whose substance is in them, when they cast their leaves; so the holy seed shall be the substance thereof."

Spurgeon now suggests that accepting Christ as savior is putting the "holy seed" deep in your heart



Truly your sins may be little; but you are lost for them without Christ. Your sins may be great; but if Christ shall pardon them, then you shall be saved. The one question, then, I have to ask of thee, is Hast thou Christ?
