# The Work of Christ: Week 3 - The Temptation of Christ

#### Introduction

- Read Matthew 4:1–11.
- Identify the theological significance: Jesus' temptation is more than a personal moral victory; it is central to His active obedience.
- Frame the lesson: Jesus is the true and faithful Son, succeeding where Adam and Israel failed.

## I. Contexts of Sonship and Temptation

- Adam, Israel, and Jesus all called "God's son" in Scripture.
- Adam: the protological son failed in paradise.
- Israel: the typological son failed in the wilderness.
- Jesus: the eschatological Son triumphed in the wilderness.

#### II. Jesus as the Second and Better Adam

- · Both Adam and Christ serve as federal heads for humanity.
- Contrast the settings:
  - Adam: Paradise, fellowship, abundance, unfallen creation.
  - Jesus: Wilderness, alone, fasting 40 days, fallen world.
- Both faced Satan's test of God's Word: "Did God actually say...?" (Genesis 3:1; Matthew 4:3).
- Christ's obedience brings righteousness and cosmic restoration (Romans 5:12–19; Colossians 1:19–20).

#### III. Jesus as the True Israel

- Jesus recapitulates Israel's story:
  - Genealogy: Culmination of Abraham and David's lines.
  - Flight to Egypt: Fulfilling Hosea 11:1.
  - 40 days/40 years: Jesus endures what Israel could not.
- Jesus' three temptations parallel Israel's wilderness failures:
  - Bread: Trust in God's provision.
  - Testing God: Refusal to demand signs.
  - Worship: Loyalty to God alone (see Deuteronomy 6-8).
- Jesus embodies the lessons Israel failed to learn, showing the sufficiency of God's Word.

### IV. The Threefold Pattern of Sonship

- Adam creation's first representative; failed.
- Israel covenant people; failed.
- Jesus the perfect Son who succeeds for His people.

## V. Theological and Practical Implications

- Jesus' obedience is credited to believers: union with Christ means sharing in His victory.
- His triumph inaugurates the new creation and reverses the curse of Adam.
- Temptation itself is not sin; it is the battlefield of faith.
