

So Paul is writing this letter to Christians in Ephesus who come from a Gentile background. Paul doesn't know them even though he knows lots of people in Ephesus since he lived there for years.


Paul is very excited about this group of believers. Chapter one contains a solid and strong description of what faith in Christ means. He uses a lot of language that only Christians would understand.

Now in chapter 2 Paul has two topics – 1) being made alive in Christ and 2) how Jews and Gentiles are reconciled through Christ.

He starts up by saying that in the past they (gentiles) were in the grasp of Satan's hand. These people "sinned" against God and "transgressed" against each other. Then he immediately goes on to say we (Jews) too were also in the grasp of Satan's hand and did the same things – just like you!!

but because of God's love and mercy He redeemed us and you as well. He is basically saying we are no different from you in God's eyes even though we come from different backgrounds - Jew and Gentile.

Paul tells them (and in turn us) that it is by God's grace you and I have a restored relationship with God through Christ. We called this being "saved". And we are saved by grace and not of works so that nobody can boast. We cannot earn our way into a relationship with God. Our relationship with Him is solely by grace through God's love and mercy.



¹As for you, you were dead in your transgressions and sins, ²in which you used to live when you followed the ways of this world and of the ruler of the kingdom of the air, the spirit who is now at work in those who are disobedient.

³All of us also lived among them at one time, gratifying the cravings of our flesh and following its desires and thoughts. Like the rest, we were by nature deserving of wrath.

⁴But because of his great love for us, God, who is rich in mercy, ⁵made us alive with Christ even when we were dead in transgressions—it is by grace you have been saved.

⁶And God raised us up with Christ and seated us with him in the heavenly realms in Christ Jesus, ⁷in order that in the coming ages he might show the incomparable riches of his grace, expressed in his kindness to us in Christ Jesus.

⁸For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith—and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God— ⁹not by works, so that no one can boast.

¹⁰For we are God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do.

¹¹Therefore, remember that formerly you who are Gentiles by birth and called "uncircumcised" by those who call themselves "the circumcision" (which is done in the body by human hands)—

12 remember that at that time you were separate from Christ, excluded from citizenship in Israel and foreigners to the covenants of the promise, without hope and without God in the world.

¹³But now in Christ Jesus you who once were far away have been brought near by the blood of Christ. ¹⁴For he himself is our peace, who has made the two groups one and has destroyed the barrier, the dividing wall of hostility,

¹⁵by setting aside in his flesh the law with its commands and regulations. His purpose was to create in himself one new humanity out of the two, thus making peace,

¹⁶and in one body to reconcile both of them to God through the cross, by which he put to death their hostility.

¹⁷He came and preached peace to you who were far away and peace to those who were near. ¹⁸For through him we both have access to the Father by one Spirit.

¹⁹Consequently, you are no longer foreigners and strangers, but fellow citizens with God's people and also members of his household,


²⁰built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus himself as the chief cornerstone.

²¹In him the whole building is joined together and rises to become a holy temple in the Lord. ²²And in him you too are being built together to become a dwelling in which God lives by his Spirit.



What is the relationship between wrath and love?


Between grace and works?



The picture the text paints is bleak. Because of sins humans are the living dead. 




But the main point of Ephesians and especially of 2:1-10 is that God will not stay out of the picture.




"gratifying the cravings of our flesh"


We should be sure to boast if we could. We are a boasting people. Man is a poor mass of flesh, and he is largely given to the corruption of pride, He will boast if he can.


How often do Christians, even after they have been given the gift of salvation, feel obliged to try and work their way to God?






On the other hand, we find it hard to believe that the facts are as good as Paul says. Does God really love us so deeply and are we actually exalted with Christ in the heavenly realms?
