

In response to a question...



The 12 tribes are the descendants of 12 brothers in the book of Genesis: Reuben, Simeon, Levi, Judah, Dan, Naphtali, Gad, Asher, Issachar, Zebulun, Joseph, and Benjamin.

Their father is a man named Jacob. God later changes Jacob's name to Israel (kind of like how God changes Abram's name to Abraham).

The 12 tribes of Israel come from the 12 sons of Israel.

Twelve Tribes of Israel

The kingdom spilts: Judah, Levi, and Benjamin stay loyal to David's dynasty. The rest of the tribes make a new king in the North: Jeroboam.

Northern kingdom

- New capital: Samaria
- Keeps the name Israel, but also goes by Ephraim (Ho 4:15–17)
- New religion: Jeroboam sets up idolatrous, non-Levite priesthood (1 Ki 12:26–33)

Southern kingdom

- Same capital: Jerusalem
- Now simply called Judah
- Same temple and priests: the Levites migrate to Jerusalem when Jeroboam sets up a new religion (2 Ch 11:13)

Isaiah Chapter 3



Judah's Leaders Judged

Note this: The Lord God of Armies is about to remove from Jerusalem and from Judah every kind of security: the entire supply of bread and water,

²heroes and warriors, judges and prophets, fortune-tellers and elders, ³commanders of fifty and dignitaries, counselors, cunning magicians, and necromancers.



4"I will make youths their leaders, and unstable rulers will govern them." ⁵The people will oppress one another, man against man, neighbor against neighbor; the young will act arrogantly toward the old, and the worthless toward the honorable. ⁶A man will even seize his brother in his father's house, saying, "You have a cloak—you be our leader! This heap of rubble will be under your control."



⁷On that day he will cry out, saying, "I'm not a healer. I don't even have food or clothing in my house. Don't make me the leader of the people!" 8For Jerusalem has stumbled and Judah has fallen because they have spoken and acted against the Lord, defying his glorious presence. ⁹The look on their faces testifies against them, and like Sodom, they flaunt their sin; they do not conceal it. Woe to them, for they have brought disaster on themselves.



¹⁰Tell the righteous that it will go well for them, for they will eat the fruit of their labor.

¹¹Woe to the wicked—it will go badly for them, for what they have done will be done to them.

¹²Youths oppress my people, and women rule over them. My people, your leaders mislead you; they confuse the direction of your paths.




13The Lord rises to argue the case and stands to judge the people.
14The Lord brings this charge against the elders and leaders of his people: "You have devastated the vineyard. The plunder from the poor is in your houses.

¹⁵Why do you crush my people and grind the faces of the poor?" This is the declaration of the Lord God of Armies.



Jerusalem's Women Judged

¹⁶The Lord also says: Because the daughters of Zion are haughty, walking with heads held high and seductive eyes, prancing along, jingling their ankle bracelets, ¹⁷the Lord will put scabs on the heads of the daughters of Zion, and the Lord will shave their foreheads bare.



¹⁸On that day the Lord will strip their finery: ankle bracelets, headbands, crescents, ¹⁹pendants, bracelets, veils, ²⁰headdresses, ankle jewelry, sashes, perfume bottles, amulets, ²¹signet rings, nose rings, ²²festive robes, capes, cloaks, purses, ²³garments, linen clothes, turbans, and shawls.



²⁴Instead of perfume there will be a stench; instead of a belt, a rope; instead of beautifully styled hair, baldness; instead of fine clothes, sackcloth; instead of beauty, branding.


²⁵Your men will fall by the sword, your warriors in battle.

²⁶Then her gates will lament and mourn; deserted, she will sit on the ground.



Let's remember that this chapter is part of the Isaiah's vision.






The message of the whole section is solemn in the extreme. Divine judgment on society begins to manifest itself in the disappearance of solid leadership and the appearance of immature, capricious leaders. Society becomes divided. The age gap opens up, values are at a discount and those who should be despised take the initiative. An air of despair dominates elections. All this arises from moral and spiritual causes. It is not the result of failures of policy but speaking and acting against the Lord and provoking him; Blatant sin inviting its just reward.





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
