Plugging in at Valley Life Community Church



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Jesus Goes Back to Heaven

Scripture

Matthew 28:16-20; Acts 1:1-11

Focus

Our risen Lord Jesus ascended to heaven and he is still with us today.

Faith Nurture Goals

- Tell what happened when Jesus ascended to heaven.
- Imagine how the disciples felt after Jesus' ascension.
- Feel secure knowing that Jesus is Lord over the whole world.
- Share the good news about Jesus.

Memory Challenge

Matthew 28:19-20

Reflection: Getting into the Story

As we begin a unit that focuses on the life of the early church as pictured in the book of Acts, it's a good idea to pay some close attention to the introduction that Luke writes to his friend Theophilus:

- "In my former book" (that is, the gospel of Luke)
- "all that Jesus began to do and to teach" (notice the word *began*, since Luke now intends to continue to tell about what Jesus is doing and teaching)
- "until the day he was taken up to heaven" (even though Jesus physically leaves, he continues to lead and guide his church)
- "through the Holy Spirit to the apostles he had chosen" (the Holy Spirit, personally sent to the church by Jesus, will now lead the church to carry out the Great Commission)

Acts isn't merely a history of the early church, it's about what the ascended Lord Jesus Christ is continuing to do as he builds his church. In Acts, the primary actor is the Holy Spirit sent by Jesus, who empowers his disciples to bring the gospel to the ends of the earth.

As you read the story of Jesus' ascension, the disciples appear to be agitated and full of questions, while Jesus is serene, speaking with absolute authority and confidence. He points to a new future in which the disciples will have a huge and important calling—to disciple the nations.

"You will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth" (Acts 1:8). That's not merely a geography lesson; it forms the outline of the book of Acts. It's fascinating to see how the little church, sometimes because of persecution, moves from Jerusalem up into Samaria, and before it's over, all the way to Rome. But in this outline we also see the church's mission today. It starts at home and then spreads into adjacent but somewhat unfamiliar territory—and eventually to the whole wide world.

It has little to do with the disciples' power or ingenuity. It's all about the Holy Spirit. Interestingly, while Jesus tells them to "go" in Matthew 28, in Acts 1 the command is "wait." The prayerful waiting on the Spirit emphasizes that this is a Spirit-led, Spirit-empowered movement. We will see hints of that all the way through. The story of the ascension is strangely austere—just one sentence. There are no descriptive adjectives, no recorded reactions, and certainly no grieving. And there's no attempt to explain its meaning apart from the few cryptic words of the "men in white."

Still, that one sentence is dense with meaningful hints. Jesus goes up, but he does not ascend like a rocket until he fades from view: "A cloud hid him from their sight." In the Bible, Old and New Testament alike, clouds always evoke God's presence: the pillar of cloud, the *shekinah* cloud that descended in the temple, and the cloud that enveloped Jesus and the disciples at his transfiguration. Here too, the cloud that receives Jesus is a sign of divine presence. Maybe God's heavenly dwelling isn't so far away, in outer space, but closer than we think—another dimension of reality we cannot see.

In Matthew 28, Jesus promises to be with us always, but in Acts 1 he leaves. Jesus' presence with us today is not like when he was on earth. It's a presence we may experience very deeply and truly, but it comes by faith, not by sight. Jesus has sent his Spirit to live in our hearts. One thing the disciples never doubted from that day on was that Jesus was leading the way to the future.

Wondering

- What were the disciples worried about?
- In what situations has it been more important for you to prayerfully wait than to audaciously go?
- What does Jesus' ascension mean for you?

Teaching

- Let kids hear the tension between Jesus' serene confidence and the disciples' concerns.
- We believe that Jesus is with us, but we're not promised any visible signs or mystical experiences. Relate your own experience to help kids understand what it means that we "live by faith, not by sight" (2 Cor. 5:7).

General Materials

Each session of *Dwell* includes specific materials you'll need for teaching it, such as printable pages or props to use for telling the story. In addition, you'll want to keep a stash of the usual church school teaching supplies: Bibles, scissors, glue, markers, pens or pencils, newsprint/board, and the like, including a CD player or MP3 player and *DwellSongs*.

Session at a Glance

Step 1 Gathering for God's Story

Before the session begins attach a copy of the story symbol to your clothing.

Welcome kids by name. Invite each one to look at the story symbol and be thinking about what today's story could be about. Ask,

- Whose feet could these be?
- What are they doing hanging over a cloud?
- Could this be an optical illusion? Sometimes we can see lots of things in clouds if we look hard enough.

Tip

If you have windows in your room and there are clouds in the sky, have kids look outside and see if they can see any shapes, things, faces, or animals in the clouds.

Тір

Here's another fun way to sing "He is the King of Kings": create sign language for the words *King, Lord,* and *Jesus*. Each time those words are sung, kids do the sign language as they sing. Tell kids they'll find out more about the story symbol soon. Invite them to offer praise to God by singing "He Is the King of Kings." If you're using the song cue cards you made last session, hand them out and have kids place their card face down on their lap. Remind them that each person should raise and lower the card whenever that word is sung.

Link kids together for prayer—either by joining hands, by linking elbows with one another, or by putting their hands on the shoulders of the people to the left and right. Use the following prayer or your own words:

Dear God, you have blessed us with a beautiful world—lakes, grassy fields, and a sky filled with beauty—stars, sun, moon, and clouds. Thank you for your wonderful gifts and for bringing us together to learn more about you. Thank you for our friends. We're joined together to show that we are one family—we all belong to your family. Be with us now as we worship you and learn more about you and your Son, Jesus. Amen.

Ask kids to think about what their parents tell them just before they go out for the evening and leave the kids with a babysitter, or when Grandma and Grandpa are going to take care of them for a few days, or when they are left alone for a short time with an older sibling in charge. Start the discussion by telling the kids what you tell your family when you are going away. Perhaps you leave a phone number or address where you can be reached or leave bedtime or supper instructions behind. Invite the group to share what happens at their homes when the parents leave.

Conclude the discussion by asking the kids why parents do that. Help them to see that parents want them to know what's really important for them to do while they are away. Parents give instructions so families will know exactly what they need to do.

Show the story symbol again. Invite the kids to prepare for the story and to find out what the cloud and feet are all about.

Step 2 Entering the Story

Open the Bible to Matthew 28. Show everyone that the first part of today's story from God's great story is found in the book of Matthew. Invite the group to greet the story together.

Storyteller: Your word is a lamp to my feet *Listeners*: and a light for my path.

Begin by reading Matthew 28:16.

The story follows:

The Bible tells us that Jesus has invited his disciples to meet him on a certain mountain. He has something very important to tell them—just like when your parents have something important to tell you.

All the disciples were there. Then Jesus came and spoke to them. He told them something important. This is what he said. (*Hold up the Memory Challenge poster and have the kids say the text with you—verses 19 and 20.*)

There were three important ideas in what Jesus said to them. We'll read the verses again so you can think about what those three ideas are. (*Read the text again.*)

What are those three ideas? (Pause for responses: Go and tell everyone about Jesus, baptize the people who believe, I will always be with you.)

Does what Jesus said make it sound like he is going away? In what way? (*Pause for responses.*)

Let's find out. (*Turn to the book of Acts and show that you will continue the story at the beginning of the book of Acts.*) After Jesus' resurrection, Jesus met with the disciples several times, proving that he was alive. He had so much to tell them. For those forty days Jesus told them about the king-dom of God.

One night at supper he told them something important—and very surprising! It wasn't a suggestion or a passing thought—it was a command. Jesus said, "Do not leave Jerusalem. Wait for the gift my Father promised you—I've told you about it before. John baptized people with water, but in a few days you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit."

Oh my! I wonder what they thought about that. If you were there and Jesus commanded you to wait for a special gift—the Holy Spirit what questions would go through your minds? (*Pause for responses.*)

When they met together again, the disciples had some questions too. So much had happened lately—Jesus' death, his resurrection, his appearances out of nowhere—and now Jesus promised this new and unusual gift. So they asked Jesus, "Lord, are you going to set up your kingdom right here in Jerusalem?" After all, they had always hoped that Jesus would be an earthly king.

Jesus said, "It's not for you to know when I will come to rule the earth. But you will receive very special power when the Holy Spirit comes on you. You will be my witnesses and tell everyone about me—here in Jerusalem and throughout the whole world!"

After Jesus said this, he was taken up into the sky right in front of their eyes. A cloud covered him, and that was the last time they saw Jesus on earth.

If you were there and saw that happen, what thoughts would go rushing through your minds? (*Pause for responses.*)

The disciples were still straining their eyes to see Jesus when suddenly two men dressed all in white stood beside them. They spoke to the disciples. "Men of Galilee, why are you standing there? Why are you looking into the sky? This same Jesus, who has been taken from you into heaven, will come again. He will come in the same way that you have seen him go."

End of story

Re★formed

The Reformed community tends to emphasize the ascension, perhaps more than other traditions, because it sees Christ as the Lord of heaven and earth, enthroned at God's right hand. Christ's reign and his claim to authority are not just for the future (though they will be complete in the future), but for right now as we orient our lives around his kingdom and mission.

Tip

Today's story contains more description and dialogue than action, so it's especially important that you read it aloud several times at home before telling it. Spend some time wondering into the story yourself as you prepare (see the Reflection at the beginning of this session). The questions and wondering statements will help hold the attention of your listeners—and so will the wonder and awe they hear in your voice. Imagine that you are a disciple. Think about everything you've seen and heard in the last few days. What is the most surprising thing that you will tell your family about when you get home? How will you explain the wonder of it all? (*Pause for responses.*)

Have a brief discussion as you look again at the story symbol. Invite kids to explain what is happening.

Then think back and share the things you remember that Jesus did in the forty days between when he arose from the grave to when he ascended into heaven. Tell kids that Jesus said so many things to give us comfort, and one of them is at the very end of the Memory Challenge text. Read the last sentence of it together. Share that one of the ways Jesus was always with the disciples, and is always with us today, is through his Holy Spirit—you'll be learning more about that next time.

Close with the following prayer or your own words:

Dear Jesus, we praise you. You are Lord of both heaven and earth. We thank you! We feel safe knowing that you will always be with us through the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Tip

Kids are usually more familiar with the story of Jesus' resurrection on Easter than they are with the story of his ascension forty days later. As kids respond to the reporter's questions, help them understand that Jesus is alive and living in heaven now!

Step 3 Living into the Story

Invite the group to imagine that they are Jesus' actual disciples and that you are a traveling reporter who has heard of the strange and almost unbelievable things that have happened. You have come to find out for yourself if what you've heard is true, since the disciples are the only ones who knew Jesus well and actually saw the ascension.

If you've brought props to make your reporting role seem more realistic, pick them up or put them on now before introducing yourself. Then say something like the following:

Thanks for meeting with me today. My name is Sunny (or Sonny) Merryweather and I'm a journalist for the *Tomorrow Show*. I have heard of some very unusual things that have happened recently regarding Jesus. Since you are his closest friends and the only ones who have actually seen what's happened, I wanted to talk with you. I walked nearly all night to get here. So let's get started with some questions. (*Possible questions follow*.)

- When people ask me who Jesus is, what shall I tell them?
- I hear that he left. How did he leave you?
- Where did he go?
- What did you think when you first saw him rising slowly off of the ground?
- How did you feel when you realized that Jesus was actually gone and was not coming back?
- What are some of your best memories of working with Jesus?
- I heard that Jesus asked you to wait for a special gift. What is that about?
- Tell me about the important job Jesus asked you to do after he left you.
- If you were going to start doing this job today—right here in this city—what would you do?
- Is there any way you can still talk to Jesus now that he lives in heaven? Tell me about that.
- What does it mean that Jesus is always with you? How does that work?
- What will you miss most about Jesus not being with you here on earth?
- Some say that Jesus promised he would come again the same way he left. That seems strange. What does that mean?

• I've heard that you often praise Jesus—especially now that's he's gone. I'd like to join you. May we do it together? (Lead the group, hav*ing them repeat each line after you.*)

Hallelujah, praise the Lord. Praise him with each note and word. Praise him for his mighty ways, for loving us through all our days. Praise that Jesus did arise, Praise that Jesus is alive! Praise that Jesus lives above. Lord of all! Lord of love! Hallelujah!

Step 4 Living Out the Story

If possible, use cardstock to print the game cards and the messages. Before the session begins, clip the game cards to the Show and Share papers. Cut out one message for each child and punch a hole in it as indicated. You'll also want to blow up a balloon for each child keep a few extras on hand in case any break.

To help kids realize that Jesus keeps his promise to be with us always and to care for us, give each one a message. Encourage kids to fill in the blank line with a few words that describe one way Jesus cares for them each day. To prompt them, offer a few examples of how Jesus cares for you.

Ask for volunteers to read their messages to the group. Then talk about what Jesus told the disciples before he went to heaven: "You will be my witnesses and tell everyone about me." Explain that when we tell others what Jesus does for us (and for them) we are his witnesses.

Then ask everyone to think of one person who really needs to know that Jesus loves and cares for us. (Suggest that they think of someone they will see today.) Have them write that person's name on the message where

it says: "Dear_ bottom of the message.

Help kids slip the yarn or ribbon through the hole in the message and tie it to the balloon. Encourage them to give this message balloon to the person they've named.

Celebrate the job Jesus gave the disciples—and us—to do as you sing and dance to your Scripture song, "Go!" (See page 50 for actions.)

As you get ready to close, give your kids a blessing, using the words found at the Finish line inside today's Show and Share paper. Tell them you have something for them to always remember:

Wherever you go in God's wide world, whatever happens to you, whether it's good or bad, always remember that Jesus is Lord!

Faith Modeling

Share with the group the peace that you enjoy knowing that Jesus is always with you. If possible, tell about a specific time you felt that peace.

Tip

If you think you'll have extra time, plan to split into groups of two or three kids and play a round of the Show and Share "Jesus Is Lord!" game together. (Use coins or buttons as movers.)

Tip

Add your phone number or email address to the front page of each paper and encourage kids (with parental permission) to call, email, or text you from home and let you know that they were able to complete the "On the Way Home" activity and to tell you how the game went. Say the blessing a second time and invite everyone to join with you in saying "Jesus is Lord!"

Before kids leave, hand out the Show and Share papers and game cards. Tell kids a little about the game and encourage them to play it at home. Invite them to let you know next week who they played it with and who won. Remind them to do the "On the Way Home" activity. If possible, set out a box of pencils and invite kids to take a pencil with them so they are ready to roll!

Easy Extras

1. Arrival Activity: King or Queen for a Day 🗛 👤 🕍

Time: 5-10 minutes Materials: paper, markers or coloring pencils

Invite kids to draw a picture (or make a word list) of what they would do if they were king or queen for a day. Look at their work and then talk about it. Point out that being a king or queen is a big job—parts of it would be fun but other parts of the job would be difficult and tiring. Explain that in the part of God's story they'll hear today, they'll learn more about the King of kings—Jesus—and about how we can help him.

2. Story Reading 🖾 🗛 👤

This activity can be used in place of Step 2: Entering the Story. **Time:** 10 minutes **Materials:** Show and Share paper

Read the story from the Show and Share paper. Talk about the picture, and follow with a brief discussion and prayer, as indicated in step 2.

3. Memory Texting Aa 🤽 🖽

Time: 5-7 minutes

Materials: text message cards in the version you've chosen (printable page 59 or 60), cut apart; optional: timer

You can do several activities with the cards; do a couple if time permits. The first time you use them, point out that the cards are written as text messages—which is appropriate because the Memory Challenge is a message from Jesus to the disciples and to us.

- Shuffle the cards and place them in a pile face down on the table. Have each person pick up a card. Each person reads his or her card and then shows it to the others. Ask the person with the first card to lay it down on a ledge or table. The others will come and lay their cards in sequence until the text is complete. Have kids read it together when the message is complete.
- Do the same activity but divide the group into two teams first. Time each group.
- Take two or three cards out of the pile as you shuffle them. Repeat the activity and see if the group can fill in the missing words.


4. Wordless Book: Jesus' Story 🖾 🗛 👤


Time: 10 minutes

Materials: book template (printable page 61), one per person; clear tape; scissors; markers; story symbols from unit 5, sessions 4-6, and unit 6, sessions 1-2

Guide the kids in creating wordless books they can use to tell the stories to their families and friends. Instructions follow:

- Cut page apart on the dotted line.
- Tape the paper together on the back side, creating a story strip that is 22" long.
- Starting with the title page on top, fold the strip like an accordion on each line, making six pages.
- Look at the story symbols and then draw your own version in this order:
 - Page 2: cross and empty tomb Page 3: winding road with stick figure Page 4: hand with a nail hole Page 5: net bursting with fish Page 6: feet above a cloud

For more fun activities that go with each story, invite your child to find the story symbol in the God's Big Story cards that matches the symbol on the front of their Show and Share paper.

The Memory Challenge for the next six weeks is Matthew 28:19-20. Your child will be bringing these verses home on a coloring poster. If your child hasn't already colored it, why not do it together? And be sure to talk about how your family can share the good news of Jesus' love with others.
