

Theme: Eve - Grace in the Garden

Read Judges Genesis 2:7,15–25; Genesis 3:1–21

Opening Question:

- What's one thing you've received in life that you didn't know you needed at the time—but looking back, you realize it was a gift from God?
- 1. God Knows What We Need (Genesis 2:7,15-25)

"It is not good for the man to be alone." — Genesis 2:18

- What stands out to you about how and why God created Eve?
- How does this show God's proactive grace, even before Adam knew he had a
- Reflect on a time in your life when God provided something (or someone) before you even realized you needed it.

Application:

God's grace is often preparing solutions before we even know there's a problem.

2. God Provides Even in Our Weakness (Genesis 3:1–13)

"Where are you?" — Genesis 3:9

- What do you notice about Satan's strategy to deceive Eve?
- Why do you think isolation made Eve more vulnerable?
- How do lies about identity and worth still affect people today?

Reflection:



Think about a time you were vulnerable to lies or shame. How did God meet you there?

Application:

Even in our sin and failure, God moves toward us—not to shame us, but to restore us.

3. God Redeems What the Enemy Meant for Evil (Genesis 3:14-21)

"He will strike your head, and you will strike his heel." — Genesis 3:15

- What does this passage reveal about the long-term plan of redemption?
- How does the promise of Jesus (v. 15) show God's grace in the midst of judgment?
- How can your failures or painful moments become part of a redemptive story?

Application:

Your failure is not final. God can use even your lowest moments for His purpose and your good.

Going Deeper (Optional)

- Read Romans 8:28. How does this verse connect to Eve's story?
- How can we help each other recognize grace in moments of failure or regret?

Prayer

"Lord, thank You that even in our failure, Your grace abounds. Thank You for knowing our needs, providing in our weakness, and redeeming our brokenness. Help us to trust You with every part of our story. In Jesus' name, Amen."
