You can do the devotional as a family or as an individual. This guide has options for lighting the candles and reading the scripture, reflecting on the questions, praying, cooking, and making art. You can choose to do all of them or to do only a few things that are meaningful to you. However you choose to use this guide, I pray that it brings you closer to God and one another in this special time of Advent.

ADVENT CANDLE LIGHTING DEVOTIONAL SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT

Find a comfortable position and take a deep breath. Tighten your fists...and release the tension you hold there. Tighten your shoulders...and release the tension you hold there. Roll your head slowly to loosen up your neck. Notice anywhere in your body that might feel tired or worried. Take another deep breath in and relax your body as best you can.

Light two Advent candles as someone says:

Today we light the candle of peace to remind ourselves that, even when we are unsure of the way forward, God's peace is with us. God was with generations before, God is with us today, and God will be with us tomorrow. Even now, God is on the way!

Pray:

Dear God,

scripture tells us you came to Joseph through an angel - loud and clear, impossible to miss. Scripture also tells us that Joseph listened and followed your way. We long to hear your voice - loud and clear, impossible to miss. We long for invitations to something more, something deeper. We long to be like Joseph and find the courage to follow. Be with us in this time. Speak to us and we will listen. Amen.

Read Matthew 1:18-25 (if you don't have a Bible handy, you can find the scripture <u>here</u>.)

Read

Joseph has a decision to make. As far as he can tell, his new wife has broken trust in their relationship. And yet, instead of punishment, he chooses not to hurt her or humiliate her in public. That alone shows what a kind and generous person Joseph was. But then God sends an angel to Joseph in a dream, telling him not to be afraid, and inviting him to an even bigger and better way of being than Joseph's best, most gracious impulse. When Joseph wakes up, he has the courage to choose this better way. He chooses to stay with Mary, to become an adoptive parent to Jesus. He chooses peace, he chooses grace. Like Mary, he chooses to say "yes!" to what God is doing with his life.

Reflection Questions

*Note from Pastor Sarah - if you are lighting the candles by yourself, take a moment to reflect on those questions and write about your answers in a journal or just on a piece of paper. If you are lighting the candles with others, take turns sharing your answers with one another.

When have you had to make a big decisions? How did you know what was the right thing to do?

When have you done something brave, even when it might have been scary? Tell the story.

Have you ever changed your mind about something or someone? What happened that helped you choose to see or think about it in a different way?

ADVENT ART PROJECT -BLOOMING SCULPTURES

Joseph had already chosen not to make a scene about Mary's pregnancy, but God wanted Joseph to choose an even better way, a way that leans into the unfamiliar and uncomfortable. Just as Joseph was invited to be flexible in the future he had imagined for himself, God invites us to reimagine what can be As we create these sculptures, we remember that our stories don't always follow the straight and narrow path we imagine but will bloom with new possibilities.

What you need:

- Thin wire garland, about 0.75-1 meter per person (the amount is very flexible)
- Wire cutters or scissors; one pair per group is sufficient.
- Optional: thin ribbon, small silk flowers, beads and/or bells with large holes

Instructions:

- Shape the wire garland into any shape you choose. You might work it into a image from the scripture, a symbol, or even a word.
- If you'd like, embellish your wire sculpture by tying on ribbons, stringing on beads or bells, or attaching small silk flowers.
- Add a loop of ribbon for hanging, if desired.
- Modification for children: you could make a paper template of a symbol or shape for kids to follow with their wire. Kids can lay the wire flat on top of a printed symbol or word and trace the template with wire.

GENERATION TO GENERATION HOLIDAY TREAT

This is a recipe that comes from Johanna Kelly. She writes "this recipe was passed down through my dad's family for generations untold; our genealogical audit so far ends back with our great-great-great grandparents born in the 1700's, so we know the recipe is at least 320 years old!"

TRADITIONAL SCOTTISH SHORTBREAD

Ingredients:

- 1/2 pound butter (two sticks/one cup)
- 1/4 pound caster sugar (half cup white cane sugar crystals)
- 1/2 pound/256 grams flour (2 cups unbleached)

Instructions:

- Cream butter and sugar together with wooden spoon
- Blend flour in by hand until the mixture breaks into little bits
- Press into a pan (modern: ungreased cookie sheet) about as deep as your little fingernail.
- Bake moderately slow; do not brown except for edges (modern: 325 degrees for 25-30 minutes)

Modern Variations: Dust with powdered sugar; add 1 tsp of pure vanilla for extra flavor; or mix with a combination of ingredients to suit your taste.
