3. Christian Nationalism:

An ideology that merges American and Christian identities. It suggests that being a true American means being a Christian and that certain political positions must be affirmed to be a real Christian. It can lead to the idolization of the nation over spiritual convictions.

4. Progressive Christianity:

A movement that emphasizes social justice, inclusivity, and personal spiritual experience over strict adherence to traditional doctrine. It may involve reevaluating traditional doctrines and prioritizing current understandings over biblical texts
