“What Is That In Your Hand?”

Big Idea

I will use what I have for God's Kingdom.

Exodus 4:1-4

Back Story:

Moses is very reluctant to follow.

Moses is hesitant to do what God wants him to do.

Moses pulls out all the excuses he can think of.

Then the Lord asked him,
“What is that in your hand?”

Picking up a snake by its tail is not a good idea:
but since it is the Lord who has instructed him, the
otherwise foolish response of picking up the snake by
the tail becomes not only sensible but faithful as well.

To Moses it was just a rod,
to God it was an instrument for miracles.

Moses' staff was very ordinary.
His hands weren't very special either,
but God decided to use them for His glory. That
meant that they would be used for miraculous things!
God can use anything that we have – the most
ordinary things – as miraculous things for His glory!

What is that in your hand?
Lord, I will use what I have for Your Kingdom.

Sermon Questions

1. Which part of the message was most impactful for you and why?
2. Read Exodus 3:9 – 4:4. What do you notice about Moses' focus (when he gives excuses) and God's focus (when He answers Moses)? What can you learn from this exchange between Moses and God?
3. What do God's responses to Moses tell us about His character?
4. How do Moses' doubts and fears resonate with your own personal experiences?
5. Why do you think God chose Moses despite his hesitations?
6. Are there any ways in which you have been holding back or making excuses when you consider serving God?
7. Read Ephesians 2:10 and Philippians 2:14-16. Reflect upon yourself as a creation of God. What is in your hand right now? How can you offer this in service to God?
