

Summary

This sermon explores the biblical concept of rest as a gift from God, not just a byproduct of exhaustion. The pastor emphasizes that rest was built into creation from the very beginning, with God resting on the seventh day and declaring it holy. Using Genesis 2:1-3 as the foundation, the message reveals that Adam and Eve's first full day on earth was a day of rest, showing that rest comes before work, not after. The sermon challenges our culture's restless lifestyle and calls believers to embrace biblical rest as a rhythm, reminder, rule, and resource. True rest involves disconnecting from devices and busyness to depend on God's provision rather than our own production, ultimately restoring our souls and reminding us of our redemption.

Intro Prayer

Heavenly Father, we come before You today grateful for this time to gather and learn from Your Word. We ask that You would open our hearts and minds to receive what You want to teach us about rest. Help us to set aside the busyness and distractions of our week and be fully present with You and with each other. Lord, we know that You have something specific for each of us in this discussion, so we pray that You would speak to us individually and as a group. Give us wisdom, understanding, and the courage to apply what we learn to our daily lives. In Jesus' name we pray, Amen.

Ice Breaker

What's your favorite way to unwind after a long day, and does it actually help you feel rested?

Questions

- The pastor mentioned that Adam and Eve's first full day on earth was a day of rest. How does this change your perspective on the purpose and priority of rest?
- What are some of the biggest obstacles that prevent you from experiencing true biblical rest in your current season of life?
- The sermon described rest as a 'rhythm, not a reward.' How do you typically view rest, and what would need to change for you to see it as a rhythm?
- God declared the seventh day holy and blessed it. What do you think it means practically to treat a day as 'holy' in our modern context?
- The pastor said 'rest exposes control, insecurity, fear, and dependence.' Which of these resonates most with you, and why do you think rest brings these things to the surface?
- Jesus said the Sabbath was made to meet the needs of people, not the

other way around. How can we find balance between honoring God's design for rest without becoming legalistic about it?

- The sermon mentioned that 'slaves work to earn value, but sons and daughters rest because we already have it.' How does understanding your identity in Christ affect your approach to rest?

- Looking at the practical suggestions given (device-free hours, prayer walks, unhurried meals, etc.). Which one do you need to implement most and why?

Life Application

This week, choose one day to practice a mini-Sabbath for at least 4 hours. During this time, disconnect from devices, avoid work-related activities, and focus on worship, rest, and enjoying God's creation. Notice what thoughts, feelings, or anxieties come up when you stop being busy, and bring those to God in prayer.
