

Summary

In this sermon, the pastor explores John 10:10, where Jesus declares that He came so that people might have life and have it more abundantly. Using the concept of "Catch 22," the pastor explains how God navigated two seemingly impossible situations: the Kinsman Redeemer Law and the loss of earthly dominion through Adam's sin. In both cases, God's solution was the same: Jesus became a man to redeem humanity, pay the ransom price for sin, and restore people to their rightful standing before God. The sermon then unpacks the full meaning of salvation, drawing on four Greek words for "Redeemer" and the New Testament word "sozo" (saved). The pastor emphasizes that salvation is not merely about forgiveness of sins and eternal life, but encompasses healing, deliverance from demonic bondage, divine protection, and personal fulfillment in God's will. The message closes with an urgent call to respond today rather than waiting, warning that delay only allows the enemy more opportunity to keep people in bondage.

Intro Prayer

Heavenly Father, we come before you grateful for the truth of your Word. Ice Breaker

What is one thing you have always wanted to learn how to do, and what has stopped you from pursuing it so far?

Questions

- John 10:10 draws a sharp contrast between what the thief comes to do and what Jesus came to do. In your own life, where have you seen the difference between the enemy's work and God's work most clearly?
- The sermon describes the Kinsman Redeemer concept, where someone close to you pays a debt you cannot pay yourself. How does understanding Jesus as your personal Kinsman Redeemer change the way you relate to Him?
- The pastor used four different Greek words to describe redemption, each highlighting a different aspect of what Jesus did for us. Which aspect resonates most with you: being purchased out of slavery, permanently departing from bondage, being ransomed, or being restored to your pristine state? Why?
- The word 'sozo,' translated as 'saved,' also covers healing, deliverance, and protection. Had you previously thought of salvation as including all of these dimensions? How does this broader understanding change your perspective on what God wants for your life?
- The sermon shares personal testimonies of people being set free from addiction, sickness, and shame. Have you ever experienced or witnessed God's power to restore someone in a dramatic way? What did that do for your faith?
- The pastor warns against the enemy's tactic of saying 'wait until tomorrow,' using the story of Pharaoh and the frogs as an illustration. Is there an area of your life where you have been putting off surrendering to God? What is holding you back?
- Galatians 4:7 says we are no longer slaves but sons and heirs. What practical difference should that identity make in how you think, speak, and make decisions on a daily basis?
- The sermon emphasizes that God wants to restore people to their 'pristine state,' even better than before. What would full restoration look like in your life, and what step of faith might God be calling you to take toward that?

Life Application

This week, identify one area of your life where you have been living as though you are still in the enemy's slave market rather than as a redeemed child of God. Write it down, bring it before the Lord in prayer each day, and take one concrete step to walk in the freedom Jesus has already purchased for you. If that

means reaching out for prayer, confessing something to a trusted friend, or simply choosing to believe God's Word over your feelings, do it today rather than waiting until tomorrow.
