



“Jesus Is Greater – Live Unshakeable” (Hebrews 12:5–13:25)

“What’s one situation this week that has tested your faith or your patience?”

Memory verse: *As a group lets speak it aloud together, as a declaration of faith.*

Hebrews 13:15-16 NLT

15 Therefore, let us offer through Jesus a continual sacrifice of praise to God, proclaiming our allegiance to his name. 16 And don’t forget to do good and to share with those in need. These are the sacrifices that please God.

Read: Hebrews 12:5–13

Discipline is not punishment; it is proof of belonging. The Father disciplines those He loves, shaping us into sons and daughters who reflect His holiness.

What’s one “discipline moment” from God that later produced growth in your life?

Why do you think we often resist God’s correction or confuse it with condemnation?

How can we tell the difference between an attack from the enemy and discipline from the Father?

What has helped you to see discipline as discipleship — a process that strengthens our spiritual “muscles” to stay steady when life shakes us?

Read: Hebrews 12:14–17; Matthew 22:37–40

You can’t love God and not love people. Living unshakeable means walking in forgiveness, refusing bitterness, and nurturing unity.

Why is living in peace linked to living a holy life?

Where does bitterness most often creep in — relationships, offense, comparison?

Who in your life might the Holy Spirit be prompting you to make peace with this week?

Read: Hebrews 12:18–24

We no longer stand at Mount Sinai (fear and condemnation); we have come to Mount Zion (grace, joy, and victory through Jesus). God invites us to live from delight, not dread.

What does it mean for you to live at Mount Zion instead of Mount Sinai?

How do shame and insecurity keep believers from walking confidently in God’s grace?

What joy or freedom has God restored in your life as you’ve embraced grace?

As a group, compare Mt Sinai joyless religion (obedience out of fear) with Mt. Zion joyful faith (obedience out of love). Which mountain are you living on today?

Read: Hebrews 12:28–29; 13:1–8, 12–16

God’s kingdom cannot be shaken — neither should His people. Gratitude, worship, and obedience are the marks of those who know their eternal home.

What does it mean that we are receiving an “unshakeable kingdom”?

In what ways can our worship become a “consuming fire” that purifies rather than destroys?

How can you live more awake to eternity this week — through service, generosity, or trust?

Take time to identify one area where you may feel “shaken” and share it with the group, then, take time to pray for a fresh filling of the Holy Spirit to bring strength and peace.

Take time to close in prayer, as you pray for each other, take time to pray for our Eggstravaganza outreach, for boldness to invite people to Easter weekend, for deep roots in faith, and for hearts fully surrendered to the Spirit.
