

Revealing His Identity Session 1

Big Idea

John's Gospel starts as Genesis does: in the beginning.

Creation is the bedrock of a biblical worldview, for it's the first ultimate truth: God made everything. He wove it like fabric. He spun it like clay. He breathed it into formation like glass.

More remarkable than what God did is the way He did it: His tool was His Word. He spoke, and it was. The apostle John traced this Word through time.

Men spoke of this Word while surrounded by both sea and sand, from human thrones and from pits of despair. One man in the wilderness, dressed in leather and camel hair, announced that this Word that gives light to everyone was coming into the world wrapped in human flesh.

A remarkable claim like this requires remarkable evidence, and John provided it for us. In John's Gospel we come to know Jesus in the same way evidence is presented to a jury in a courtroom. John introduced witnesses who testified of the Word made flesh. He examined the words Jesus said about Himself. He described the things Jesus did that testified of His divinity.

Everything you're about to see points to one conclusion: Jesus Christ is the Son of God, and

A large crowd of people immediately flocked to them, attracted by the One they had seen work miracles. The disciples worked during Jesus' allday healing and teaching service, were directed to distribute food for dinner, and then had to pick up all the leftovers. It had been a long day; all they wanted was to get back to their boat, row home, and sleep. As it turns out, their long day was about to get longer.

Revealing His Identity

Revealing His Identity Session 1

Robby pointed out that this situation was the second time Jesus took something the disciples knew well—the lake—and used it to teach them dependence on Him.

The accounts of Jesus walking on the water contained proof of Jesus' divinity: the fact that He walked on the waves (see Job 9:8) and His response to the disciples' fear.

Read Matthew 14:27-33.

Matthew's account gives further insight into the events of that evening, particularly Peter's involvement. But it also shows us something important that happened after Jesus got into the boat.


How did the disciples respond to what Jesus performed that evening on the lake? What proof do you think convinced them?

think about what we saw before Jesus walked on the water. Jesus intentionally took time at the end of a long day to go off by Himself to pray. We don't often think of Jesus as needing to rest and be refreshed. While we don't know exactly what He was praying in this instance, we see an invaluable example for our relationship with God.


Big Idea

We learned last week that John's Gospel was written to prove that Jesus is the Messiah. Each week of this Bible study was specifically developed to prove Jesus' identity to you, whether it's by the language John employed or by the words of a witness he recorded.

By the time of the events of today's passage, Jesus had already called five disciples: Andrew, Peter, Philip, Nathanael, and John. This group had been to a wedding party (see John 2:2), had taken a trip to Capernaum for a few days (see 2:12), attended Passover in Jerusalem (see 2:13), met with a religious leader (see 3:1-2), journeyed into the Judean countryside (see 3:22), and taken a short-term mission trip to Samaria (see 4:4).

Jesus' ministry had been eventful too. He had already begun making a name for Himself as a miracle worker, a teacher with authority, and the Savior of the world.

Even though the official might not have gotten the response he had anticipated from Jesus, his faith wasn't shaken. Knowing Jesus was capable of healing his son, he punctuated the intent of his question with an urgent plea: "Come down before my boy dies!" (v. 49). This man was desperate, and he knew the only One who could heal his son was Jesus.



Big Idea

It takes years to produce a single grape that's edible. In fact, if a vinedresser is going to plant a vineyard, he's supposed to prohibit the tree from bearing any fruit at all for a few years. While this strategy is disheartening and may seem unfair, the reason is simple. The roots of a young grapevine aren't strong enough to support the weight of the fruit until it has been seasoned for a while.

Growing grapes was common knowledge in the first century, particularly in Israel. For generations Scripture compared Israel to a grapevine, and God was the Vinedresser.

But one fact stands out as we look at the history of Israel. They were more often than not a bad vine. The fact that they were God's chosen people didn't stop them from living in almost constant rebellion. It got so bad that God ceased giving them His Word for hundreds of years until one miraculous day when He sent His Word in the flesh to walk among us.


What fruit have you seen from the pain and growth of pruning?

Big Idea

It was Passover, the most important celebration in Jewish culture. This festival looks back to the time of Moses, when God freed the Israelites from their slavery in Egypt. This particular Passover was going to be memorable for an important reason: it would change the entire world.

John 13–19 encompasses one single night and the following day in the life of Jesus and His disciples. It's a tense time in the narrative. The pieces were already in play that would lead to the arrest and crucifixion of the Son of God. As we read, we watch them unfold almost in real time.

As Jesus gathered His closest followers together in an upper room to celebrate the Passover feast, He took the opportunity to make the final preparations they would need before launching out and taking His gospel to the nations.

In John 14 Jesus revealed something about Himself that's essential to His character: He's the only way to get to the Father.

When Robby began, he was in a hallway that had one entrance and one exit. The only way to get to the hallway was by the staircase in front of him, and the only way to get to the room behind him was by the hallway.

Robby explained the context of Jesus' words in regard to cultural practices in preparation for a wedding. Jewish fathers negotiated a bride price, the son went back to his father's house to build a room for his bride, and then he returned one day to bring his bride home when everything was ready.

Read aloud John 14:1-6.

What ways do people try to find God other than through Jesus?

While the groom was preparing a place for his bride, there was no sure way to know when he was coming back. It entirely depended on when his father decided the son's room was ready to receive her.

Describe what you think was going through the bride's mind while the groom was away.

Knowing the groom was coming back to get her, the bride needed to make sure she was ready when he arrived. That way when she saw him cresting the hill and coming toward her house, she didn't have to collect her things or prepare herself to be taken away. She was ready at a moment's notice.

What responsibility do we have, like a firstcentury Jewish bride, once we understand what Jesus has gone to do?

What does that responsibility look like in the different aspects of your daily life?


Pray

Jesus' statement "You know the way to where I am going" (v. 4) may have initially confused the disciples, but it makes perfect sense. The bride wouldn't necessarily know where her new house was, but she certainly knew the way there: the bridegroom was coming back to get her.

In the same way, we can know for certain the only way to get back to the Father. It's through Jesus Christ, the One who's already been there and is coming back for us.

Big Idea

The sheer concept of God—the everlasting Creator of the entire universe who's bigger than the stars He made, more powerful than the storms He controls, and seated on His throne in a realm of splendor we can't even imagine—is difficult for some people to come to terms with.

We all have a tendency to think that way. If we aren't careful, we can slip into the same trap of thinking that what we see is all there is. Or we may begin to place eternal significance on things that are going to go away.

Through a conversation with a Pharisee named Nicodemus, we'll see how Jesus shed some light on a subject that escaped even one of the most renowned teachers of Israel: the kingdom of God. We'll also see how understanding what Jesus told Nicodemus changed the course of his life.

Opening

In the previous group session you considered the great price that was paid and the preparation God made for a loving covenant relationship with you. How did understanding the tremendous value your Heavenly Father sees in you affect the way you saw your life this past week? When was it helpful this week to remember that your life is a walk of faith? Were there times when you felt discouraged that you weren't further along? Were you encouraged to know that you needed to take each moment step-by-step?

In what ways did the exclusive nature of knowing God by following the Son affect your daily walk?

What else was meaningful to you this past week in your reading, journaling, or personal study? Why?

In this session we'll see where Nicodemus went when he had questions. We're going to look at his conversation with Jesus and come to realize that nothing has changed in the two thousand years since this conversation occurred. The kingdom of God is at hand, and we're each responsible for where we place our faith.

Although we don't know Nicodemus's immediate reaction, Robby pointed out that this isn't the last time we see him in Scripture. At the end of Jesus' life, Nicodemus made provisions for Jesus after He died on the cross. His actions seem to prove his loyalty to and belief in Jesus Christ as the Son of God.

If someone were writing your biography and wanted to include something that demonstrated your belief in Jesus, what do you think they would write? How would you describe the lostness or darkness in your life before believing in Jesus?

How has the new birth changed your life for the sake of God's kingdom? Although we most often stop with John 3:16, why is it important to recognize the urgency and seriousness of verses 17-18?


As a Christian, how do you want to be remembered?

Robby concluded by asking whether you have been born again, experiencing the kingdom of God in your own life. It's important to take time and encourage one another as believers by sharing our stories. What did you first know about Jesus?

Pray

Take time to reflect on your life, thoughts, and desires. Are there things you would rather shove into a cupboard than expose? List them. You don't have to show your list to anybody, but simply writing it down is important.

Take time to pray for the strength to release those things, whether they're sins, strongholds, or fear. Lay them at the feet of Jesus, who was raised up so that we could live.

Seeking in Our Doubt Session 6

Big Idea

Aside from Jesus' inner circle of disciples (Peter, James, and John), Thomas is perhaps the most famous. He didn't write a Gospel, He didn't speak a great number of lines in Scripture, and his post-Gospel history is largely speculative. Yet we remember him vividly.

He's the doubter. Doubting Thomas, we call him. In just a few lines his reputation has been sealed in our minds—though perhaps unfairly.

God is more remarkable the more we see Him and the more we see those He uses. He specifically chose Thomas because he represented what Jesus was most interested in. Therefore, Thomas is someone we can learn from.

Thomas may not be the doubter after all. Maybe it's time to think of him as something different. This week we're going to explore what true seekers of Christ look like.

Read

Robby explored three different Scripture passages that mention Thomas. Read aloud John 11:11-16. As Jesus informed His disciples that they were going back to Bethany, where He had just been rejected for claiming to be one with the Father, His disciples knew precisely the kind of danger He was in. They first tried to talk Him out of going by insisting that Lazarus would get better. When have you been hesitant to trust God? What kinds of excuses do you often offer for not doing what the Lord calls you to do?

Notice what Thomas said in verse 16: "Let's go so that we may die with Him."

Is there anything you would be willing to die for? If so, what?

Read aloud John 14:1-7.

Thomas's question proves the second aspect of his nature: he was devoted not only to Jesus but also to the truth. He wanted to understand even if it meant asking something Jesus may have considered a dumb question.

How committed are you to the truth, even if it's difficult to hear?

Read aloud John 20:24-29.

Thomas was noticeably absent when Jesus appeared the first time. Robby speculated that the reason Thomas was missing wasn't that he feared for his life (he had already proved that he was willing to die for Jesus) but that he was so wracked with sadness and grief that he couldn't bear to be around others so soon after his Master died.

If you had been in Thomas's position, how would you have reacted to the news that Jesus was back?

What kind of proof do you ask from Jesus to prove Himself?

When Jesus finally appeared to Thomas, He presented him with exactly the evidence he had asked to see. Jesus knew the heart of His disciple and was prepared to remove every barrier to his belief.

What proves to you that Jesus is who He says He is?

Would you consider yourself a passive believer or an active seeker of Jesus?

Seeking in Our Doubt

ession 6

What has been challenging, encouraging, or insightful from the case of the famous doubter Thomas?

Pray

If there's anything Thomas teaches us, it's that it's OK to ask questions. We see questions throughout Scripture. We see people pressing forward in their faith in spite of doubt, and that's OK because the opposite of belief isn't doubt but disobedience. Thomas may have had his doubts, but they weren't doubts leading to skepticism; they were doubts leading to his proclamation that Jesus was both Lord and God (see John 4:28).
