

Lesson 14: Schizophrenia



Schizophrenia describes a person whose mind is divided between what is real and what is not.

- 1896 Emil Kraepelin termed it "dementia praecox" (premature dementia).
- 1908 Eugene Bleuler coined the term "schizophrenia".
 - Both believed schizophrenia to be hereditary.
 - Both were eugenicists.

5 Symptoms of Schizophrenia:

- 1. <u>Delusions</u>: believing things that are not true
- 2. <u>Hallucinations</u>: hearing and/or seeing things that are not real
- 3. <u>Disorganized Thinking and Speech</u>: difficulty in organizing one's thoughts or making logical connections between ideas.
- 4. <u>Disorganized or Abnormal Motor Behavior</u>: *unusual or unpredictable movements or behaviors that are not culturally/socially appropriate.*
- 5. Negative Symptoms: the absence or reduction of normal behaviors.

Must have at least 2 symptoms...

5 Symptoms of Schizophrenia:

- 1. <u>Delusions</u>: *believing things that are not true*
- 2. Hallucinations: hearing and/or seeing things that are not real
- 3. <u>Disorganized Thinking and Speech</u>: *difficulty in organizing one's thoughts or making logical connections between ideas.*
- 4. <u>Disorganized or Abnormal Motor Behavior</u>: *unusual or unpredictable movements or behaviors that are not culturally/socially appropriate.*
- 5. Negative Symptoms: the absence or reduction of normal behaviors.

Must have at least 2 symptoms, and one must be from the first 3 on the list. Must display symptoms for 6 months without any other identifiable cause.

Medical Conditions That Can Mimic Schizophrenia:

- Brain Tumor / Brain Injury
- Encephalitis
- Epilepsy
- Endocrine Issues
- HIV (Human Immunodeficiency Virus)
- Syphilis
- Fahr's Syndrome
- Malaria

Drugs That Can Mimic Schizophrenia:

- Alcohol
- Amphetamines
- Antibiotics
- Antihistamines
- Cannabis
- Cocaine
- Hallucinogens (LSD, PCP, certain Mushrooms, etc.)
- Heart Medications (certain Beta Blockers and ACE Inhibitors)
- Opioids
- Sedatives

Other Facts About Schizophrenia:

- Affects 1 in 222 people (0.45% of the population)
- Affects men and women proportionally
- Typically affects men earlier than women:
 - Men late teens to 20's
 - Women 20's to early 30's

How Is Schizophrenia Diagnosed?

No laboratory, psychometric, or radiologic studies currently exist for diagnosing schizophrenia. (*Schizophrenia*, National Library of Medicine)

Do We Know What Causes Schizophrenia? No.

It is estimated that between 220,000 and 270,000 individuals with schizophrenia were sterilized or killed. This total represents between 73% and 100% of all individuals with schizophrenia living in Germany between 1939 and 1945... However, postwar rates of the incidence of schizophrenia in Germany were unexpectedly high. The Nazi genocide of psychiatric patients was the greatest criminal act in the history of psychiatry. It was also based on what are now known to be erroneous genetic theories and had no apparent long-term effect on the subsequent incidence of schizophrenia. (Schizophrenic Genocide: Nazi Attempts to Eradicate Schizophrenia, National Library of Medicine)

Do We Know What Causes Schizophrenia?

More than a century since the delineation of dementia praecox by Kraepelin, the etiology, neuropathology and pathophysiology of schizophrenia remain elusive.

Etiology = the cause

Neuropathology = its effect on the nervous system

Pathophysiology = how it changes the body's functions

The existence of a specific brain disease underlying schizophrenia remains a hypothesis. Against a background of an ever-increasing volume of research data, the inconclusiveness of the search for causes of the disorder fuels doubts about the validity of the schizophrenia construct as presently defined. (*The Diagnostic Concept of Schizophrenia*, National Library of Medicine)


How Do Secular Psychiatrists Treat Schizophrenia?

Historically: such people were committed to insane asylums

1930's: doctors started performing lobotomies

1950's: advent of antipsychotic drugs (today an \$18 billion industry)

Approximately 50% of people currently in mental hospitals have a diagnosis of schizophrenia.

Daniel 4:31-33


1 John 4:4

You are from God, little children, and have overcome them; because <u>greater</u> is He who is in you than he who is in the world.

Schizophrenia is not an explanation of a person's symptoms. Schizophrenia is merely a hypothetical <u>construct</u>.

A <u>Construct</u>: An idea or theory containing various abstract elements, typically one considered to be subjective and not based on empirical evidence. (Oxford Dictionary)

Many of the models used in psychology are hypothetical constructs. (American Psychiatric Association's Dictionary of Psychiatry, "Construct")



When you put a pseudoexplanation on somebody's psychotic state, you actually hide or obstruct discovering or truly diagnosing what's going on with them. (Berger, Schizophrenic Unicorn, Truth in Love Podcast 466)

N2: Moderate Sleep

- Heart rate and respiration slow
- Blood pressure decreases

What is the cause of the person's sleep issue?

- Is it physical? (biological or substance related)
- Is it spiritual? (anxiety, guilt, fear, etc.)

Helping a Person with Psychosis:

The issues:

- Abused as a young child
- Experiencing auditory and visual hallucinations
- Hallucinations happening at times and in settings that corresponded with their past abuse
- Trouble going to sleep and staying asleep
- Would often stay up most the night full of anxiety
