



#### CHRISTIAN HISTORY

...it took Zwingli years to discover the power of this Word. After graduating from the University of Basil in 1506, he became a parish priest in Glarus. From the beginning, he took his priestly duties seriously. He later wrote, "Though I was young, ecclesiastical duties inspired in me more fear than joy, because I knew, and remained convinced that I would give an account of the blood of the sheep which would perish as a consequence of my carelessness."



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The feeling of responsibility for his charge (rather than like Luther, a personal search for salvation) motivated Zwingli's increasing interest in the Bible. In an age when priests were often unfamiliar with the Scriptures, Zwingli became enamored with it, first after purchasing a copy of Erasmus's New Testament Latin translation. He began teaching himself Greek, bought a copy of the Erasmus Greek New Testament, and started memorizing long passages. In 1519 he began preaching from the New Testament regularly.

#### The Regulative Principle

(Zwingli's approach)

If the Scripture doesn't explicitly command us to do something, then we're not going to do it

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#### The Normative Principle

(Luther's approach)

If the Scripture doesn't explicitly prohibit us from doing something, then we are allowed to do it










ZWINGLI'S DISPUTATION BEFORE THE ZURICH CITY COUNCIL




Zwingli should be loved for:



## STATUE OF ZWINGLI IN ZURICH

"Every saint, every work, every movement is a mixture of God's gracious operations and our often sinful and inadequate actions. So, none of the figures [of church history] was perfect. Some of them did much good, wrote much that is helpful, and demonstrated enormous courage. But sometimes they also did harm by their inadequate or confused teaching about the Christian faith or by the style in which they lived it. Like us, both personally and intellectually, their sanctification was not complete. So what we can honor and imitate we should, but we ought never to be blinded by unthinking admiration."
