



Hosea

“For the Lord has a covenant lawsuit against the people of Israel.”

Transition

- The first three chapters focus on the story of how Gomer, the wife of Hosea, violated the marriage covenant with her husband.
- This story was orchestrated by God to be a metaphor for how Israel – God's bride – violated its covenant with God – the covenant He had established with Abraham.
- Despite her unfaithfulness, Hosea continued in his love for Gomer, he pursued her, bought her out of captivity, and restored her as his wife.
- From Chapter 4 on, Hosea tells the people how *their* story will end.

Hosea 4:1a

Listen to the Lord's message, you Israelites!
For the Lord has a covenant lawsuit against the people of Israel.

Hosea 4:1b

For there is neither faithfulness nor loyalty in the land,
nor do they acknowledge God.

NET 2nd

Because there is no faithfulness or kindness or
knowledge of God in the land.

NASB95

There is no faithfulness, no love, no acknowledgment
of God in the land.

Lacking

No faithfulness!

No love!

No acknowledgement of God!
