

CONSIDER THE SOURCE – FROM THE BEGINNING

- Chapter One, verse 1: "The word of the LORD"
 - The Source: from God
 - Substance is authoritative
 - The Messenger: a human
 - Style is as unique as the individual writer
 - What is your favorite illustration for the process of divir revelation?
 - How about a telegraph transmission?
 - Literary form?
 - Poetic

(with narrative exceptions; 1:1 and 2:10+11)



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Textual criticism?

- Predicting fall of Nineveh 612 BC
- Changes from poetic to narrative and back
- One coherent message with unity and flow in a collection of oracles point to one author as ascribed to by its ancient supporters and conservative scholars

Date?

- Zephaniah's ministry 640-609 BC
- Before or after Josiah's reforms? 622 BC
 - Impact may have strengthened the faithful remnant?

- Location?
 - 1:4, 10-12
 - Judah, Jerusalem
 - Fish gate, Second Quarter
 - "Mortar" is a district of Jerusalem
- Audience?
 - Add 1:8 and 3:3+4 to the above
 - Southern Kingdom, Princes, Priests, Judges, and Prophets of Baal



Purpose?

- Warnings of Judgment
- Promise of Restoration
- The Day of the Lord more references than any other OT book
- Called the Reader's Digest of OT Prophesy: "Zephaniah alone emphasized more strenuously than them all the universality of its judgment while also surprisingly predicting the conversion of the nations as one of its fruits."
 Walter C. Kaiser Jr., Toward an Old Testament Theology, pp. 223

- Theology? (What to look for)
 - Sovereignty of God
 - Wickedness of man
 - God's justice and His priority on repentance
 - God's mercy and grace, His responsiveness to repentance
 - God's inextinguishable love of Israel and His focus on the remnant
 - God's plan of salvation
 - Apocalyptic eschatology

• Theme?

- The Day of the LORD: "Perhaps 1:7 summarizes what the book is all about better than any other single verse: "Be silent before the Lord God! For the day of the LORD is near" Dr. Thomas L. Constable
- "He is coming back, but first there are some things to get settled..." (TLO paraphrase): "God will intervene in history, catastrophically, to judge humanity's complacency and indifference, and to restore His people to the conditions of blessing that He originally intended for them to enjoy." Adapted from G. Campbell Morgan, Living Messages of the Books of the Bible, 1:2:289-301.

- Judge the world Universal Judgment
- "remove" asaph [aw-saf'] and sup [soof] = utterly consume, as in cease to exist
- "completely" kol [kole] = the whole, in its totality, "all means all"





CONSIDER THE

- CONSEQUENCES
 Chapter One, verses 2-6: God's Judgment
 - Verses 4-6 Judging various idolators (See Jeremiah 2:13)
 - Baal worshippers, v4 "remnant"?
 - sar [sheh-awr'] = residue, remainder
 - Versus 2:7+9, 3:13: "remnant" she'eriyth [sheh-ay-reeth'] = what is left, having escaped, descendants
 - Worshippers of astral deities, v5
 - Syncretists, v5 ("spiritual smorgasbord")
 - Milcom/Malcham/Molech Ammonite child sacrifice
 - Apostates, v6 ("turn back" sug [soog] = renounce)
 - Unbelievers/pagans, v6

- Look beyond! —after wrath, healing (3:9-20)
 - Conversion of Gentile peoples (3:9)

 - And so—the new Jerusalem (3:16-20)

- 1. Read the text/passage for the next lesson every week.
