III. Summary

(11:25-11:30)

In this first section of Round Two of speeches, Job withdraws from his friends and his hope for deliverance, and towards wanting a one-on-one with God. His suffering is becoming less his focus, and wondering where God is and why He is allowing all this becomes his main concern.

- A. Job is convinced of his innocence. His friends' easy answers and accusations are unhelpful.
- B. Job's friends say since God is fair and since Job is being cursed, he must have caused it. *In* our world where things make sense, you have overlooked some obvious faults. Your claims of innocence and implications of God's unfairness make it apparent to us.
- C. God remains silent.
- D. God sometimes has plans which fit kingdom purposes which don't fit the world we can see, understand and hope to control.
- E. To make God's good character and to lament real suffering are mutually possible.
- F. Real friends do well to not solve what they don't understand. But friends do get involved.
- G. You can know accurate things about God in your head but sometimes life experiences make those difficult to hold onto.

IV. Discussion

- A. "Those who do well think that those who don't caused their own pain" (paraphrase of 12:5). If this is true, what might those *who do well* think caused them to do well? And how does that prepare them for the day when they might not do so well?
- B. In Job 12:9, Job says that what is happening to him comes from the hand of God.
 In what way is that true? In what way is it not true? What are the implications for us when we go through bad things? Please read Lamentations 3:37-38 and Isaiah 45:6-7 and Amos 3:6 before answering. Why do people have a hard time with this particular truth?
- C. What is Job's main message to man? What is his main message to God?
- D. How might we help others during such times, and what could we pray for them in such times?
