Intentional Parenting: Class 2

- I. Two Questions to Consider:
 - A. Are we aware as parents it is primarily our responsibility to disciple our children?
 - 1. For years parents have dropped their kids off at youth group or church hoping the church will teach them, or they go to church with their kids, but don't feel they know enough about the bible to disciple their children.
 - B. As parents do we feel inadequate to disciple our children?
 - 1. If so, let's start off with some biblical truths to help prepare us to disciple our children.
- II. We can raise kids who love us, love themselves, live morally upright, and who are ridiculously successful, but if they don't treasure Christ our parenting has missed the mark.
- III. The Kitchen
 - A. What are the ingredients of family discipleship?
 - 1. The Gospel
 - 2. The Big Story (Biblical Theology)

 - B. The Gospel ~ means Good News
 - 1. 1 Corinthians 15:1-4, Romans 1:16, John 3:16, Romans 5:8.
 - 2. It is crucial that we have a good understanding of the Gospel. Can we explain what Jesus did, why He did it, and what we need to do to have everlasting life?
 - 3. The truth of God's sovereignty and holiness compels us to reject all socalled gospels that are man-centered.
 - 4. The good news is not that we should do something, but rather that God has already accomplished salvation for all who will believe in what Jesus has done for us.
 - 5. There are some false Gospels that we need to be aware of:
 - a) The False Gospel of Personal Improvement: This urges you to adjust your thinking, attitudes, and actions in order to earn the favor and blessing of God. We CAN'T earn God's favor.
 - b) The False Gospel of Prosperity: Did you know that God wants you to be lavishly wealthy? The hope of the prosperity gospel is found in a present-day emphasis on material wealth.
 - c) The False Gospel of Peace and Purpose: The message is that God's wonderful plan for your life is to give you peace and purpose. Sounds kind of biblical, doesn't it? Jesus says in

Matthew 10:34: Do not think that I came to bring peace on the earth; I did not come to bring peace, but a sword.

- d) The "Pray the Prayer" False Gospel: This is the grandaddy error of them all. If you have spent much time presenting the gospel to strangers you have probably heard, "I haven't been to church in years, but I am a Christian-when I was in the fifth grade I prayed and asked Jesus into my heart." Countless people have been taught, explicitly or implicitly, that saying a particular prayer grants them guaranteed entrance into the celestial city. We know that we are saved by Grace through Faith. No work of man will save us.
- 6. Continued Good News:
 - a) Galatians 2:20, Romans 6:6. Eph: 2:4-9
 - b) When Jesus was crucified we were crucified. When Jesus died we died. When Jesus was raised from the dead, we were raised from the dead. God made us alive together with Christ, and raised us up with Him, and seated us with Him in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus.
- C. The Big Story (Biblical Theology): The Big Story Points to God:
 - 1. God is not only in control, He is also Holy. Holiness is most commonly associated with moral purity or perfection, and rightly so, but God's Holiness also includes His transcendence. This is critical. God must not be reduced in our estimation to a superior version of ourselves. We were created in His image, but God is so much greater than us and so different that if we saw Him in even a tiny fraction of His glory we would immediately die. It is because of this transcendent otherness that no one can come to know God on their own terms. God alone sets the rules for how we relate to Him.
 - 2. Romans 1:18-20
 - 3. The Bible is about God working in the lives of men, women, and children, directing all of history toward a sure conclusion. God is the main character of Scripture and His sovereign grace is vividly on display, from Genesis to Revelation.
 - 4. When we see that the Bible is really telling one Big Story about God and His purposes, we can come to difficult or challenging passages with a far more constructive approach.
- D. The Big Truths (Systematic Theology)
 - God's Word; God's Character; The Trinity; Creation and God's Providential Rule; Human Nature and Sin; The Person of Jesus; The Work and Ministry of Jesus; The Person and Work of the Holy Spirit; Salvation; The Church; and Last Things.
 - 2. This is an effort to compile everything the Scripture says about a particular topic and systemize the results into statements of doctrinal truth.

- 3. Many Christians shy away from theological learning and study. They think it's too hard, or not important, or even unspiritual. This is a huge mistake. Your children are going to formulate their ideas about the Bible, God, man, salvation from somewhere. If you do not teach your children biblical doctrine, they will be forced to synthesize key ideas(about who God is and who they are) from random bits of truth and falsehood they collect from church, peers, teachers, social media, and the media.
- 4. Knowing and teaching the Big Truths of Scripture to our children is vital to their spiritual growth and development.
- E. The Great Commission:
 - The Bible not only teaches us what we ought to believe about God. It shows us that God has a purpose for His people on this earth, what the purpose is, and how He desires to use us to help accomplish it. God has given His people the great task of taking His gospel into the world. It is vital that our children see the missional heart of God for the world, while coming to understand how God is glorified through our faithful witness.
 - 2. Matthew 28:16-20. FBC mission statement: Ask if there is anyone who can recite it.
- F. Spiritual Disciplines:
 - 1. 1 Timothy 4:7b Discipline yourself for godliness; for bodily discipline is only of little profit, but godliness is profitable for all things, since it holds promise for the present life and also for the life to come.
- G. Christian Living:
 - 1. Read Romans 12
- H. Worldview:
 - A worldview that is not genuinely biblical and therefore God-centered will inevitably be man-centered. Worldview also helps us develop biblical philosophies for education, economics, and law. Passing along biblical wisdom to our children will serve them well going forward.

Group Questions for Discussion:

- 1. When was the last time you shared the gospel with someone? What did you say in sharing the gospel? Did the person trust Christ at that time?
- 2. What is a favorite Bible story that you tell your kids about?
- 3. What fun ways are you using to tell your children about God?
- 4. Is there someone in your life that has discipled you? If so how have you grown because of being discipled?

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
