
Judges 17:6, 21:25 In those days Israel	had no king; everyone did what	was right in his own eyes

V. RUTH

- Focus shifts to the seed/king Gen 49:10, Num. 24:7, Deut. 17:14-16
- At Israel's darkest hour, when the warlords ruled, God breaks in with light of hesed—covenant faithful love
- Connects Abraham to David and to Bethlehem; connects David to Abrahamic Covenant, not Mosaic

SHECHEM REVISITED

[Joshua] said, "Then put away the foreign gods that are among you, and incline your heart to the Lord, the God of Israel." And the people said to Joshua, "The Lord our God we will serve, and his voice we will obey." So Joshua made a covenant with the people that day, and put in place statutes and rules for them at Shechem. And Joshua wrote these words in the Book of the Law of God. And he took a large stone and set it up there under the terebinth that was by the sanctuary of the Lord. And Joshua said to all the people, "Behold, this stone shall be a witness against us, for it has heard all the words of the Lord that he spoke to us. Therefore it shall be a witness against you, lest you deal falsely with your God."

And [Abimelech] went to his father's house at Ophrah and killed his brothers the sons of Jerubbaal, seventy men, on one stone. But Jotham the youngest son of Jerubbaal was left, for he hid himself. And all the leaders of Shechem came together, and all Beth-millo, and they went and made Abimelech king, by the oak of the pillar at Shechem.



THE CONCLUSION

TYPOLOGY

- Boaz is a type of Christ—he sacrifices, weds a Gentile to do the right thing by the daughter of the covenant, brings back to life a line thought ended, and brings rest to his bride.
- Ruth is a type of redeemed Gentiles—she becomes one the people of God by her commitment to the kinsman-redeemer and her proclamation of loyalty (1:9).
- Naomi is a type of ethnic Israel—Naomi mediates Ruth's entrance into the covenant relationship with Boaz; the young widow rejuvenates the old and bitter woman, on her own and without hope.


