Scripture

Read together Luke 1:26-38

"In the sixth month of Elizabeth's pregnancy, God sent the angel Gabriel to Nazareth, a village in Galilee, to a virgin named Mary. She was engaged to be married to a man named Joseph, a descendant of King David. Gabriel appeared to her and said, "Greetings, favored woman! The Lord is with you! Confused and disturbed, Mary tried to think what the angel could mean. "Don't be afraid, Mary," the angel told her, "for you have found favor with God! You will conceive and give birth to a son, and you will name him Jesus. He will be very great and will be called the Son of the Most High. The Lord God will give him the throne of his ancestor David. And he will reign over Israel forever; his Kingdom will never end!" Mary asked the angel, "But how can this happen? I am a virgin." The angel replied, "The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you. So the baby to be born will be holy, and he will be called the Son of God. What's more, your

relative Elizabeth has become pregnant in her old age! People used to say she was barren, but she has conceived a son and is now in her sixth month. For the word of God will never fail." Mary responded, "I am the Lord's servant. May everything you have said about me come true." And then the angel left her."

Thought #1: Carrying the Hope of Jesus Can Be Overwhelming

Mary was presented with a huge opportunity, but with it came much fear. Pastor Kevin reminded us that when we make ourselves available, we shouldn't be surprised when He asks of us things that feel much bigger than what we are comfortable with.

We may have questions like Mary did. How? Why? Am I worthy?

Reflect on a time, either past or present, when God asked something big of you. Something that felt far outside your comfort zone. Were you reserved? Did you have questions? What feelings did you have before you said "yes"? How did it unfold? What did you learn through that time or circumstance?

Mary was called to literally deliver Jesus to a world in great need of him. We are called to deliver Jesus to the world around us, still desperately in need of Him.

What does that look like for you during this Advent season and beyond?

Thought #2: Carrying the Hope of Jesus is About Being Favored

Revisit Luke 1:29-30

"Confused and disturbed, Mary tried to think what the angel could mean. "Don't be afraid, Mary," the angel told her, "for you have found favor with God!"

What does it mean to be found with favor? Pastor Kevin shared that biblically, it can mean grace & kindness or acceptance & delight. He also reminded us that to be favored doesn't mean easy.

Mary was looked down upon for being pregnant and unmarried.

She nearly lost her fiancé because of this fact.

She and her family had to flee the threat of Herod.

She ultimately would watch her son, Jesus, crucified on the cross.

How do these facts challenge your view of the word "favor"? Where have you seen the Lord's grace, kindness, acceptance, and delight in the most unlikely or unfavorable circumstances? As with Mary, how can our obedience lead us to be instruments of His favor (bringing grace, kindness, acceptance, and delight to the world around us)?

Thought #3: Carrying the Hope of Jesus is Connected to Obedience

We cooperate with God working IN us so He can work THROUGH us.

Reflect on the statement above. How does this challenge you? How does it encourage you? Just as in Mary's case, obedience often requires vulnerability. Recall a time, either past or present, that you have felt called to obedience that left you feeling vulnerable and exposed. How did God meet you in that vulnerability? In what ways did He provide the protection and strength you needed to walk out this path?

Obedience also can come with inconvenience. We can only assume that Mary was on a very normal path for a girl her age. Betrothed to marry, she would start a family and be very happy. Yet, when the Angel visited her she chose to set aside her reputation, her body, her will, and her personal comfort...for Jesus.

Where do you feel the inconvenience of obedience in your own life? How have you been called, either past or present, to set aside your comfort for Jesus? How can we offer our obedience to God, as Mary did, to make His hope known?

Response:

As you go from this time together, consider this prayer:

I am the Lord's servant, have your way in me and through me. Who is it that you would want to use

me to deliver the living hope of Jesus Christ? Help me to push through the fear and trust you fully!
