 - what is going on in someone's mind that is battling self-righteousness?

Let's look from the woman's perspective.

- how do you think she felt as the center of attention as this unfolded?
- what do you think she was the most thankful for in the whole ordeal?
- She came face-to-face with "life-saving grace"
 - do you think her life was affected moving forward? If so, how?
 - what would have changed for her

We can see others as recipients of God's grace.

- How does seeing people as recipients of God's grace change the way we see them?
- If you could see people this way, how would that concept change your life?
