

1. Read Psalm 92:1-5 — ***Flourish Through Grateful Worship.***

- Verse 1 says, “It is good to praise the Lord.” Why do you think the psalmist emphasizes that worship is good for us, not just pleasing to God?
- The message described worship as something that recalibrates our hearts and gives us God's perspective. How have you experienced that to be true in your life?
- The psalmist proclaims God's steadfast love in the morning and his faithfulness at night. What practical habits help you begin and end your day with that rhythm of worship?
- Verses 4-5 remind us to find joy in God's works rather than our circumstances. Why is that distinction so important when life is difficult?

2. Read Psalm 92:6-11 — ***Flourish Through Trusting God's Timing.***

- Why does the prosperity of people who ignore God sometimes become a source of discouragement or temptation for believers?
- The wicked are compared to grass that springs up quickly but soon withers. What does that teach us about the difference between temporary success and lasting blessing?
- The sermon warned us not to confuse one chapter of someone's life with the whole story. Why is that an important perspective to remember in today's comparison-driven culture?
- The message stated, “Godly faithfulness almost always grows slower than worldly success.” How does trusting God's timing change the way we measure success?

3. Read Psalm 92:12-15 — ***Flourish Through Remaining Rooted in God.***

- Why do you think the psalmist compares the righteous to trees instead of grass? What qualities do palm trees and cedars communicate about the Christian life?
- The sermon contrasted being planted vs. being potted. What stood out to you about that illustration? In what ways can someone attend church without truly becoming rooted?
- Verse 14 says that those who are rooted in God continue bearing fruit even in old age. What does that teach us about spiritual maturity and lifelong faithfulness?
- Verse 15 shows that the purpose of a flourishing life is to proclaim God's character. Why is it tempting to make spiritual growth about ourselves rather than about displaying God's goodness to others? How does the gospel reorient our motivation?
