

Joel: The Day is Coming

Turn Back

- 1. Read Joel 2:1-17 Turn Back with All Your Heart.
 - a. What is different about this "day of the Lord" described in Chapter 2 compared to Chapter 1? Which of the descriptions in Verses 2-11 stood out most to you?
 - b. What are some ways God might "sound the trumpet" in our lives in order to call us to pay attention and turn back?
 - c. Why do you think Joel emphasizes "rending your heart" instead of "rending garments"? What's the difference between surface-level change and inward transformation?
 - d. Joel describes God as "gracious and compassionate, slow to anger and abounding in love." How does knowing God's character help motivate true repentance?
- 2. Read Joel 2:18-27 *Turn Back and Experience Restoration*.
 - a. What does it mean that God is "jealous" for his people (Verse 18)? How is this different from human jealousy?
 - b. Why is it significant that God doesn't just stop the devastation in our lives but actually brings renewal and blessing?
 - c. Why is the spiritual restoration of our relationship with God (Verse 27) even more important than physical restoration of our lives?
 - d. How have you witnessed God redeem wasted years and lost opportunities in your life or in the lives of others?
- 3. Read Joel 2:28-32 Turn Back and Receive God's Spirit.
 - a. In the context of the Old Testament, what was significant about the promise of the outpouring of God's spirit "on all people" in Verse 28?
 - b. How does Joel's prophecy here connect to the day of Pentecost in Acts 2?
 - c. How does the Holy Spirit empower believers today? Can you think of a time when you've experienced his guidance, conviction, or boldness?
 - d. What does it mean to "call on the name of the Lord"? How does this step highlight the simplicity of salvation? What holds people back from taking this step?
