

Next Steps: You Taking Yours So We Can Take Ours *Go*

- 1. Have you ever said "yes" to something before knowing all the details? How did it turn out?
- 2. Read Matthew 9:35-38.
 - a. What do these verses reveal about Jesus' heart for the lost and our role in reaching them?
- 3. Read Isaiah 6:1-4.
 - a. Who is Uzziah? How did his death affect the people of Judah? When you view the bleak outlook of our world today, what reminders of God's sovereignty bring you hope?
 - b. What are the seraphim? What do the seraphim's actions teach us about God's holiness?
- 4. Read Isaiah 6:5.
 - a. Why does Isaiah respond with "Woe to me! I am ruined!" instead of excitement at seeing God? Why do you think Isaiah specifically mentions his "unclean lips"?
 - b. What part of your identity (skills, gifts, achievements) are you most tempted to take pride in? How does God's holiness contrasted with our sinfulness put that in perspective?
- 5. Read Isaiah 6:6-7.
 - a. How is the seraph touching a coal to Isaiah's lips a precursor to what Jesus does for us?
- 6. Read Isaiah 6:8.
 - a. Why should "Send me!" be the natural response from someone who is aware of the sinfulness in their life and also aware of God's grace in their life?
 - b. Why do we often instead respond by saying, "Why me?" or "Not me!"?
 - c. In addition to overseas missions, what are some everyday ways we can "live sent"?
- 7. Read John 20:21.
 - a. How exactly was Jesus sent and how should we replicate that as his disciples?
- 8. Read Romans 10:14-15.
 - a. How does Paul build a case for the necessity of living sent here?
- 9. Looking ahead, what commitment (big or small) could you make today to prove your obedience to Jesus that says, "Here am I. Send me"?
