

## **5-Day Bible Reading Plan and Devotional Guide**

### **Series: Homesick for Heaven**

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#### **Day 1: Eternity Planted Within You**

Reading: Ecclesiastes 3:11

Devotional: God has sewn eternity into the fabric of every human heart. That restless longing you feel, the sense that something is missing, the quiet ache that even your best days cannot fully satisfy, is not a flaw. It is a divine signature. You were not made for this world alone. You were made for something permanent, something whole, something unbroken. The dissatisfaction you carry is not a sign that life has failed you. It is a sign that heaven is calling you home. Do not silence that longing. Let it draw you closer to the God who placed it there.

Reflection: Where in your life do you feel the deepest longing for something more? What does that longing tell you about what your heart was made for?

Practical Application: Set aside five minutes today to sit quietly and acknowledge the areas of your life where you feel most unsettled. Bring those places honestly before God in prayer, and ask him to redirect that longing toward a deeper awareness of his presence and the hope of heaven.

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#### **Day 2: This World Is Not Your Home**

Reading: 1 Peter 2:11

Devotional: Peter calls believers temporary residents and foreigners. That is not an insult. It is a reminder. When you feel out of place in this world, when its values clash with your convictions, when its pace wears you down, you are experiencing something true about your identity. You do not fully belong here. The desires of this world wage war against your soul not because you are weak, but because you are in enemy territory. A soldier stationed far from home does not redecorate the barracks and forget the mission. Stay focused. You are passing through, not settling in.

Reflection: In what ways have you been tempted to treat this world as your permanent home? What habits or priorities reflect that tendency?

Practical Application: Identify one area of your life where you have been clinging too tightly to something temporary. Take a deliberate step today to loosen your grip, whether through generosity, surrender in prayer, or a simple act of releasing control to God.

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### **Day 3: Glimpses of Heaven in a Dark World**

Reading: Matthew 5:14-16

Devotional: God does not leave us without reminders that heaven is real and that it is coming. He places glimpses of it all around us and, more remarkably, within us. A moment of unexpected kindness, a sunset that stops you mid-step, a reconciliation that seemed impossible, these are not accidents. They are previews. And God intends to deliver those previews through his people. You are not simply waiting for heaven. You are meant to carry it into the dark places around you. Your words, your patience, your generosity, your presence in someone's hardest moment, these are the glimpses a broken world is desperate to see.

Reflection: When have you recently witnessed or experienced a glimpse of heaven in the middle of ordinary or difficult circumstances? How did it affect your perspective?

Practical Application: Intentionally offer one act of kindness or encouragement to someone in your life today who is walking through a hard season. Do it quietly and without expectation of recognition, as an act of worship.

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### **Day 4: Hope That Does Not Disappoint**

Reading: Romans 5:1-5

Devotional: Paul writes that suffering produces perseverance, perseverance produces character, and character produces hope. That progression is not comfortable, but it is trustworthy. The hope Paul describes is not wishful thinking. It is a confident, anchored expectation rooted in the love of God poured into our hearts. When life feels like an endless rotation of hardship, it is tempting to stop hoping altogether. But the promise of heaven gives suffering a context it would not otherwise have. Your pain is not the final word. Your loss is not the last chapter. God is writing something beyond what you can currently see, and it is good.

Reflection: How has suffering shaped your character or deepened your faith in ways you did not expect? Where do you need to allow hope to re-enter a situation you have given up on?

Practical Application: Write down one difficult circumstance you are currently facing. Beneath it, write what you believe God could be producing through it, even if you cannot fully see it yet. Return to that note throughout the week as a reminder of his faithfulness.

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### **Day 5: Made for Eternity, Sent with Purpose**

Reading: Philippians 3:20-21

Devotional: Paul reminds us that our citizenship is in heaven. But he wrote those words from prison, not from a comfortable distance. Knowing your true home does not excuse you from your present mission. In fact, it fuels it. When you understand that this world is temporary and that heaven is certain, you stop hoarding your energy and start spending it freely on the people around you. You become less afraid of loss because you know what is waiting. You become more generous, more courageous, more present. You are a citizen of heaven living on assignment. Do not waste the time you have been given. Show up. Shine. Point people home.

Reflection: How does the certainty of heaven change the way you think about your daily responsibilities, relationships, and opportunities to serve others?

Practical Application: Ask God in prayer today to show you one person in your immediate circle who needs to see a glimpse of heaven through you this week. Then take one concrete step toward that person, whether through a conversation, a meal, a letter, or simply your consistent and faithful presence.
