

WHAT IS WRONG WITH MY CHRISTIAN LIFE? (Romans 7:7-20)

- Some verses to consider:

- A. The BELIEVER'S Relationship to the LAW. (7:1-6) - Every believer has _____ positionally to the law by becoming united to Jesus Christ {to - conditionally - bear fruit to God} and has been _____ from the Law positionally to now serve the Lord conditionally in the newness of the Holy Spirit and not in the oldness of the Law.
- B. The LAW'S Relationship to the SIN NATURE. (7:7-12) - The Law, which is holy, just, and good, does not really _____ sin but _____ the sin nature _____ to perform it, though there is nothing wrong with the Law which came from God but there is something inherently wrong with us, even after our justification {being declared righteous} before God by faith alone in Christ alone.
- C. The Believer's Confusion of the NEW NATURE'S CONFLICT with the SIN NATURE and SPIRITUAL DEFEAT. (7:15-25)
