

Summary

In this sermon, Pastor discusses the concept of theology as the study of God, emphasizing that everyone is called to be a theologian - not just seminary professors or scholars. He references various theologians throughout history who understood theology as faith seeking understanding, sacred teachings leading to salvation, and the study that transforms our lives. The sermon focuses on 2 Corinthians 10:1-5, where Paul discusses spiritual warfare and the weapons believers have that are not physical but spiritual, designed to pull down strongholds and take captive every thought to make it obedient to Christ.

Questions

1. The pastor mentioned that 'every one of us is called to do theology.' How would you define theology in your own words, and how do you practice it in your daily life?
2. What does it mean to you that 'the weapons of our warfare are not carnal, but mighty through God'? What are these weapons?
3. The sermon identifies strongholds as thought patterns that control us. What strongholds have you recognized in your own thinking?
4. How does our culture promote imaginations and thoughts that 'exalt themselves against the knowledge of God'?
5. What practical steps can we take to 'bring into captivity every thought to the obedience of Christ'?

6. The pastor said, 'I have to know who I am in relation to God.' How has your understanding of who God is shaped your understanding of yourself?
7. How has studying God's Word transformed your thinking about a particular situation or relationship in your life?
8. The sermon suggests that our presence as believers should impact others without us saying a word. Have you experienced this? How can we cultivate this kind of spiritual influence?

Life Application

This week, identify one negative thought pattern or stronghold in your life. Each time this thought arises, practice taking it captive by immediately replacing it with a truth from God's Word. Write down the negative thought and the biblical truth that counters it. At the end of the week, reflect on how this practice has affected your spiritual warfare and your relationship with God. Be prepared to share one insight you gained from this exercise with the group next time.
