Consult the Scriptures:

Ephesians 6:5-9 Philemon 8-18

(See also: Col. 3:22, 1 Pet. 2:18, Deut. 21:15-17, 23:15-16, Matt. 19:3-8, Ex. 21:1-6, 16, 20, 23:9, Gen. 39:3-6, 41:39-43, 1 Cor. 7:20-24)

Discuss:

- 1. Read Ephesians 6:5-9 and discuss. What is it about this passage that we often find so difficult?
- 2. The Bible is often viewed by critics as being pro-slavery. Is that true? Why or why not? As a group, recall some examples from this week's sermon.
- Citing Dr. Williams, Pastor Patrick said, "Permitting something or regulating it does not necessarily communicate that someone (namely God) is for it."¹ What does that mean? (For example: see Deut. 21:15-17, Matt. 19:3-8) How might it relate to the issue of slavery in Scripture?

- 4. Read the following passages and discuss: Ex. 21:1-6, 16, 20, Deut. 23:15-16. With Genesis 1 and 2 in view, how do these passages inform us concerning God's heart towards all humanity, and particularly, the subject of slavery?
- 5. From the sermon, recount some of the differences between the subject of slavery in Scripture (particularly in first century Rome) and in our own experiences as a country.
- 6. Read Paul's letter to Philemon and discuss. What stands out to you? Identify the harmony between Philemon and Eph. 6:5-9 and discuss how it might inform God's people today.
- 7. What challenged you with this week's sermon? What questions do you still have? What's your next move?
