

Life Group Questions The Big Picture Week 1 | Luke 18:9-14 | Feb 11, 2024

ICEBREAKER: When have you been in the presence of someone who was markedly better at something than you? How did that feel? Was there a lesson to learn from the experience?

1. What stood out from Sunday's message? What encouraged, challenged, or intrigued you?

Read Luke 18:9-14

- 2. According to verse 9, why did Jesus tell this parable, and who was the target audience?
- 3. What motivated the Pharisee to pray? (v.11) What prompted the tax collector to pray? (v.13)
- 4. What lesson is found in v.14 regarding how these two men prayed?
- 5. How do you approach God in your prayers? Is there anything you'd like to change in that?
- 6. What do you like / not like in the PRAY method introduced on Sunday? What are the benefits to using it? What are the drawbacks?
- 7. Why does God honor the prayers of a humble person?
- 8. What steps can you take this week to cultivate a spirit of humility?
- 9. Take time to pray as a group using the PRAY model. Don't require everyone to pray, but encourage people to take a step of faith—whether that's praying out loud or sharing a vulnerable request.
- 10. Encourage group members to utilize the 40 Days of Prayer Verse Packs. Day 1 begins Wednesday. Have group members reflect on the verse each day and to pray the Faith Church prayer request listed.

BONUS 1 — Hand out copies of *Growing in Prayer*. Have group members circle the bullet points they have experience with and are confident they could help someone grow in those areas. Have them put a checkmark next to up to three bullet points they would like to grow in.

Discuss as a group. Do some people want to grow in areas that others have experience with? Ask those with checkmarks to identify one they'd like to pursue. Discuss a plan of action to grow in that area.

BONUS 2 — Encourage extra participation in prayer during this series. Besides praying as a group, pray for one another during the week. Set the pace by texting or emailing the group and sharing a prayer request. When someone else shares one, be sure to pray and to follow up for any updates.
