DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

1. What makes Jesus' command to love our enemies so difficult to live out?
2. Which part of Jesus' teaching challenges you the most: loving enemies, doing good, blessing, praying, or not retaliating? Why?
3. What is the difference between simply not hurting someone and actually loving them?
4. How can responding with kindness change a difficult relationship or situation?
5. What is one practical way you can live out Jesus' teaching this week?

Heart- Level Reflection Questions

1. Is there someone in your life whose name or face came to mind when Jesus said, "love your enemies"? What emotions come up when you think about them?
2. Have you ever experienced mercy or kindness from someone when you didn't deserve it? How did that impact you?
3. In what area of your life are you tempted to retaliate instead of respond like Jesus?
4. How has Jesus shown mercy, patience, or love to you even when you were undeserving?
5. What would it look like for you to take one small step toward loving, blessing, or praying for someone who has hurt you this week?
