Some Biblical Stories that Include Angels

- Jacob wrestles with an angel (Genesis 32:22-31).
- An angel guided Moses during the exodus from Egypt (Exodus 14:19).
- An angel closed the mouths of lions in the lion's den (Daniel 6:21).
- Angels appear to Mary and Joseph and shepherds (Matthew 1, Luke 1-2).
- An angel comforts Jesus in Garden of Gethsemane (Luke 22:43).
- An angel freed Peter from prison (Acts 12:1-11).
- Angels with accompany Jesus when he returns (Matthew 24:30-31).

Some Details about Angels

- The word angel literally means '<u>messenger</u>'.
- Angels are mentioned at least <u>118</u> times in the Old Testament and <u>188</u> times in the New Testament.
- Bible defines two groups of angelic messengers.
 - <u>Holy</u> angels that carry out the commands of God.
 - Fallen angels that carry out acts of deceit and wickedness.
- Angels were created as a separate order of beings with an internal <u>hierarchy</u> that includes at least one archangel (*Michael*; Jude 9), plus cherubim, seraphim, principalities and powers and thrones and dominions (Jude 9; Daniel 10:13; 8:16; Genesis 3:24; Isaiah 6:2; Ephesians 3:10; 6:12; Colossians 2:10; 1 Peter 3:22).

- There is also the <u>Angel of the Lord</u> mentioned in the Old Testament who is <u>Jesus Christ</u> (Genesis 16:7-14; 31:11-13).
- Angels are spirits, they are beings who don't have <u>bodies</u> (Psalm 104:4; Hebrews 1:7).
- Yet we see demonic spirits have the capacity of to <u>inhabit</u> the bodies of humans (Matthew 12:43–45; Luke 11:24–26).
- Throughout the Bible angels appear in various <u>forms</u> including: with wings, in human form, with no form but only as bright flashes of light, and no visual appearance at all with only their voices heard.

- Angelic beings play many different <u>roles</u> serving many different purposes in the bible including messenger, guide, healer, protector, and warrior.
- In the Bible angels carry out many different tasks including:
 - Praising, worshiping, and rejoicing
 - Making appearances on God's behalf
 - Acting as God's instrument of judgment
 - Bringing answers to prayers
 - \circ $\,$ Making announcements and delivering news
 - Providing guidance
 - Observing and overseeing
 - Encouraging and caring
 - Supporting and protecting

A General History of Angels and Satan

- The angels were created by God <u>before</u> or <u>during</u> the creation of the Earth (Gen 2:1; Job 38:4-7).
- Satan (Lucifer, the Devil) appears at least <u>52</u> times in the Bible.
- Satan (*śāțān*) is Hebrew for <u>adversary</u>.
- Devil (*diábolos*) is Greek for <u>slanderer</u>.
- He is seen in the Old Testament, is mentioned in <u>every book</u> of the New Testament, and Jesus taught his existence (Matthew 4:1-11; John 8:44).
- He was originally created by God as a <u>good</u> angel.
- Satan originally had an exalted position with God, and was the <u>protector</u> of God's throne (Ezekiel 28:11-14).
- He <u>resided</u> in the holy mountain of God, was powerful and perfect in wisdom, beauty, character and conduct.
- While in heaven, Satan became filled with violence, pride and untruth, and <u>sinned</u> in rebellion against God (Ezekiel 28:15-17).
- ▶ He desired to share God's <u>position</u>, control the host of heaven, and God's chosen people. He envied and desired God's glory, power, and authority (Isaiah 14:12-15).
- There was a great battle in Heaven and Satan, at his rebellion, was cast out of Heaven along with the angels who followed him, <u>1/3</u> of all angels (Revelation 12:3-9).
- The core of Satan's sin was that he wanted to be <u>like God</u>, which still characterizes his work on earth still today.
- Satan now works to steal, kill, destroy, and <u>devour</u> (John 10:10; 1 Peter 5:8).
- He disguises himself as an <u>angel of light</u> (2 Corinthians 11:14).
- Satan will eventually be thrown into the lake of burning sulfur, no longer able to <u>deceive</u> or <u>destroy</u> (Revelation 20:10).

Answering Common Questions About Angels

- 1. Should we seek out interactions with angels?
 - Many people say, "Angels have a lot to tell us about God and life."
 - <u>No one</u> in the Bible ever pursues communication with angels, or recommends seeking to hear from angels.

- When an angel appears to people in the Bible, it always comes as a total surprise to them.
- The most common opening words of an angel to a human are "Fear not" or "Do not be afraid" (Genesis 21:17; Matthew 28:5; Luke 1:13, 30; 2:10).
- You can't <u>believe</u> everything you hear from angelic beings any more than you can believe everything you hear from other people.
- When God's angels speak to human beings, they don't <u>contradict</u> the Bible.
- The apostle Paul warns Christians not to <u>accept</u> another gospel, even if it comes from an angel (Galatians 1:6–9).

2. Do we each have a guardian angel?

- Many people say, "Angels are assigned as bodyguards for every child."
- Though angels are certainly concerned with the affairs of humans (Hebrews 1:14), the Bible makes no mention of *Guardian Angels* (specific angels assigned to certain people).
- Some people think that Jesus referred to guardian angels when he spoke about "<u>little ones</u>" (children) and "their angels in heaven" in Matthew 18:10.
- In context, Jesus isn't assuring people that children will never come to harm; instead, he's warning adults never to be the cause of children "<u>stumbling</u>" or sinning (verses 3–6).
- These angels aren't watching the <u>children</u>, but looking to God— probably awaiting orders from God to avenge anyone who despises or abuses children.
- <u>No biblical text</u> gives any indication that angels assist us with our money or business, or help us work out our family problems.
- Rather, the Bible tells us to look to <u>God</u> for guidance and help in all our daily concerns.

3. Should we expect angels to visit us?

- Many people say, "Angels are appearing to people all the time."
- Angel appearances are usually important and generally <u>uncommon</u>.
- The Bible does not teach or suggest that we should expect angels to visit or appear to people.
- Hebrews 13:2 tells us about angels in disguise but the main point is that we should <u>show hospitality</u> to strangers, not that we might normally encounter angels.
- This verse probably refers to the hospitality that <u>Lot</u> showed to visitors who did turn out to be angels (Genesis 19).
- Though it is uncommon to be visited by an angel, it is clearly <u>possible</u>.

• The Bible tells us that one day, we will judge angels (1 Corinthians 6:3).
