

That's Just Your Interpretation



It's all too common for someone to point out something the Bible says and have somebody respond, "Well, that's just your interpretation," as if when it comes to what the Bible says there's nothing more than personal opinion. But is that true? Is interpreting the Bible just the reader's opinion, completely subjective, so that when it comes to the Bible it's a free-for-all? Believe what you want, read it how you wish, because it doesn't say anything definitive?

I'm afraid that's a cultural myth. There's an actual field of study for interpretation called *hermeneutics* defined as "the science of interpretation." And it is a science—a series of steps, practices, disciplines, and rules that apply to interpretation.

But make no mistake—99% of the Bible doesn't take any heavy lifting in regard to interpretation. Here's some quick reading. In the Old Testament book of Deuteronomy it says, "Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God, the Lord is one" (6:4, NIV). So is there one God or two? One! In the Old Testament book of Exodus it says, "You shall not steal" (20:15, NIV). Is it okay to steal or not? It's not! In the New Testament book of I Thessalonians it says, "... Jesus died and rose again" (4:14, NIV). Did Jesus die and rise again or not? The Bible says that He did. So is the Bible obscure in its meaning? No.

So why do so many claim that the Bible is difficult to understand? For some, it's not in trying to grasp the most obvious reading, but in accepting the *implications* of that reading. It's interesting how when you don't like something you read, you can suddenly find yourself having a hard time understanding.

Lee Strobel says to pretend that your daughter and her boyfriend are going out for a Coke on a school night. You say to her, "You must be home before 11." Now suppose it gets to be 10:45 and the two of them are still having a great time. They don't want the evening to end, so suddenly they begin to have difficulty interpreting your

instructions. They say: "What did he really mean when he said, 'You must be home before 11?' Did he literally mean us or was he talking about you in a general sense, like people in general? Was he saying, in effect, 'As a general rule, people must be home before 11?' Or was he just making the observation that generally, people are in their homes before 11? I mean, he wasn't very clear, was he?

"And what did he mean by, 'You *must* be home before 11?' Would a loving father be so adamant and inflexible? He probably meant it as a suggestion. I know he loves me, so isn't it implicit that he wants me to have a good time? And I am having fun, so he wouldn't want me to end the evening so soon.

"And what did he mean by, 'You must be home before 11?' He didn't specify whose home. It could be anybody's home. Maybe he meant it figuratively. Remember the old saying, 'Home is where the heart is?' My heart is right here, out having a Coke, so doesn't that mean I'm already home?

"And what did he really mean when he said, 'You must be home before 11?' Did he mean that in an exact, literal sense? Besides, he never specified 11 p.m. or 11 a.m. And he wasn't really clear on whether he was talking about Central Standard Time or Eastern Standard Time. I mean, it's still only quarter to seven in Honolulu. And as a matter of fact, when you think about it, it's always before 11. Whatever time it is, it's always before the next 11. So with all of these ambiguities, we can't really be sure what he meant at all. If he can't make himself clearer, we certainly can't be held responsible."

There's no doubt that some parts of the Bible are hard to understand. It reflects the places, histories, cultures, and languages of places long ago and far away. Sometimes it helps to have some background information on those issues to get the best sense of it, and there are some passages that people might disagree about. But on the essential teachings and issues, the Bible leaves little room for confusion.

As Mark Twain was known to have quipped, "It's not the parts of the Bible I don't understand that disturb me, rather it's the parts of the Bible that I *do* understand that disturb me."

Get Ready

Read

Mark 13:32-33 (NLT)

No one knows the day or hour when these things will happen, not even the angels in heaven or the Son himself. Only the Father knows. And since you don't know when that time will come, be on guard! Stay alert!

Reflect

Have you ever heard anyone claiming they knew when Jesus would return? Based on today's verses, what would be your response to that?

People have been predicting the return of Jesus for centuries. But guess what? They have never been correct. The past couple of years, the chatter on the internet has been: Is the Covid-19 pandemic the end of the world? Is this part of the tribulation? It seems like every time a catastrophe occurs, people wonder if this is the end. Some people are definitely preoccupied with finding out when He'll be back. According to a Washington Post article from March 17, 2020, the Pew Research Center conducted a survey in 2010 that said 41% of Americans believed that Jesus would return by 2050 but it was unclear what they based that prediction on.

But can we really predict Jesus's return? Should Christians, or anybody for that matter, put any stock in doomsday claims? According to Jesus in today's verses, no! Jesus clearly stated that no one knows when Jesus would return. In fact, He said that He didn't even know when He would return. Only God the Father knows.

When Jesus came to earth as a man, He took on aspects of humanity but remained fully God. Understanding the dual natures of Christ (fully God/fully man) can be difficult. Just as it is difficult for us to wrap our minds around the Trinity. God has revealed so much to us about Himself, and yet, some things remain a mystery to us and beyond our human capacities to comprehend. How Jesus could be fully human and thus, have a limited knowledge of His own return, but at the same time be fully God and therefore have infinite knowledge is difficult to grasp. But the Bible records that Christ emptied Himself and took on human form in Philippians 2:7. When Jesus walked the earth, He explained that He didn't know the day or hour of

His own return and the created beings in heaven do not know either. Only God the Father knows the day and time that He has set.

So, rather than jumping on the next doomsday prediction bandwagon, what does Jesus say we should do? He warns that we should always be prepared. We can't predict His return, but we can live in expectation of it. We should always "be on guard" and "stay alert." We know for sure that He is coming back, and we know for sure that every day is one day closer than the day before.

In Matthew 24:42-51, Jesus repeated His statement that no one knows when the Lord is coming so we should be ready and watchful. He compared it to being on night watch. We don't know when threats are coming and we don't know when a thief may break into the house, so we should always be ready. Jesus also used an illustration of two servants that were left in charge while the master was away. One of them used his time wisely and completed his tasks efficiently and purposefully because he wanted to be found faithful if the master should suddenly return. The other servant was lazy and did not steward his time well. He spent his days mistreating those in his charge and carousing instead of working. Jesus said that when the master returned to find the servant mismanaging his time and his tasks, that servant was punished in hell.

We cannot know when Jesus will return. But we do know that He will. And when He does, will He find us faithfully stewarding our time, our gifts, and our resources? Will He find us believing His Word and expecting His return in faith? In Luke 18:8, Jesus asked a similar question: "...when the Son of Man returns, how many will he find on the earth who have faith?" Let's always be ready, friends.

Lord, I long for Your return but I admit that I often get caught up in the cares of this world and all my worldly tasks. Help me to diligently anticipate Your return and wisely steward the gifts that You have given. Help me live more expectantly. I want to be found faithful, Lord. Amen.



Consider your nominations through thoughtful prayer.

We also ask that you do not nominate someone whose current term has not yet expired. The term expiration dates are listed next to each of the current board members names. If their term does not expire at the end of 2022 please do not nominate them as they will continue to serve until their term has expired.

Nominating someone doesn't mean the person will accept the nomination or that they are eligible. The current board members will contact your nominees to find out if they are both eligible and whether or not they will accept your nominations.

Nominations are due no later than November 6, 2022.

They can be mailed in to the office or brought in and put in the nomination box located on the table in the lobby. The election of board members will take place on December 6, 2022. Election ballots will be available on that day in the lobby and in the bulletins. We ask that you attend worship that day to turn in your ballots.

The Annual Congregational Meeting will then take place following worship services on Sunday January 8, 2023. We highly encourage you to attend the Annual Congregational Meeting. If you have something you want to address at that meeting please contact the office to be placed on the agenda.


