Sermon Summary

The Parable of the Good Samaritan for Mission (Luke 10:25-37)

Rev. Bill Sanders led a 4-week Thursday Bible study, "Cotton Patch Gospel," this past August. It presents the Gospel of Christ in the geographical context of Georgia. It is a contextualization of the gospel of Christ.

The gospel of Christ originated from the land of the Jews in the first century. The Cotton Patch Gospel is a presentation or re-presentation of the gospel of Christ in the context of Georgia, America. So, as I understand, its purpose is to make us participate in the gospel of Christ here and now, in our contemporary lives. The gospel presented in a Jewish or Greek culture is transformed fitting to a culture of Georgia, America. The location of Koinonia Farm in Georgia is a place where we can experience the gospel of Christ today. "Christians at Koinonia Farm rejected violence, lived interracial fellowship, and embraced their neighbors, many of whom were Black tenant farmers," overcoming "suspicion, hostility, and harassment" and surviving despite being "boycotted and bombed" (from the Bible study material, "A Note on The Cotton Patch Gospel" by Clarence Jordan).

Transporting the Gospels to the twentieth century has sometimes jarring results. Bethlehem becomes Gainesville, Georgia; the manger becomes an apple box; crucifixion becomes lynching. The message of Jesus becomes personal – and disturbing.... When the Gospel moves across the centuries and comes home to us, we are invited to participate. When we recognize ourselves in the transcendent story, the Word does indeed become flesh. (from the Bible Study material, "Introduction to The Substance of Faith" by Dallas Lee)

The Cotton Patch Gospel explains the biblical conception of Christian mission, which is a work of translating into and presenting the Gospel of Christ to our contemporary life: It is a work of incarnation of the Word of God, Jesus Christ, our Lord, into our real-life contexts. We should not keep the Gospel of Christ just in our thoughts or imaginations but transform it into our concrete experiences. We must embody the image of Christ in our everyday lives. We must carry out the gospel of Christ in our thoughts, speeches, and actions. Our understanding of the Gospel of Christ must permeate our bodies. It is the reality of the Gospel of Christ. This is the mission of God fulfilled in the incarnation of the Son of God, Jesus Christ, our Lord:

John 1:14 The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us. We have seen his glory, the glory of the one and only Son, who came from the Father, full of grace and truth.

In the last class, August 2025, Rev. Sanders presented the geographical theology of the New Testament. A geographical location of Scripture manifests a theological understanding. The history of God's salvation is embodied in the human or Jewish contexts. A geographical location signifies who God is, what the gospel of Christ is, or what the gospel of Christ means. Rev. Sanders explained the significance of Samaria for the

incarnation of the gospel of Christ. The parable of the Samaritan is an embodiment of the image of Jesus Christ and his gospel.

At the time of Jesus, in the first century, Samaria was a place for those who were worse than pagans. The Jews considered pagans as animals, who belonged to a lower level of humanity, and Samaritans as worse than animals, who belonged to the lowest level of humanity. The Jewish understanding of Samaritans reflected their racial or geographical prejudice. When Jesus criticized the Jews about their ignorance of God and revelation through him, they responded to him:

John 8:46-48 (Jesus said) Can any of you prove me guilty of sin? If I am telling the truth, why don't you believe me? Whoever belongs to God hears what God says. The reason you do not hear is that you do not belong to God." The Jews answered him, "Aren't we right in saying that you are a Samaritan and demon-possessed?"

For the Jews, being "Samaritan" is identical with being "demon-possessed." They considered Samaritans the worst human race. However, in the parable of the Good Samaritan, Jesus presented a Samaritan as a role model of the one who shows God's love for all: He is the one who loves his neighbor as he loves himself, perhaps more than himself. The Wisdom of God was incarnated in Jesus, who lived like a Samaritan and was treated even worse than a Samaritan. The Jews crucified Jesus. They placed him in the worst place for human beings. They lynched Jesus, treating him worse than a Samaritan. However, God radically or dramatically reversed their lynching to his loving care for all nations, including Samaritans:

Galatians 3:13-14 Christ redeemed us from the curse of the law by becoming a curse for us, for it is written: "Cursed is everyone who is hung on a pole." He redeemed us in order that the blessing given to Abraham might come to the Gentiles through Christ Jesus, so that by faith we might receive the promise of the Spirit.

The lynching tree becomes the incarnation of God's wisdom, power, and unfailing love for the salvation of all nations. A Samaritan identified himself with a person who was victimized and exploited by thieves on the streets. The people of religion, nationalism, or supremacy, like priests, law teachers, and Pharisees, avoided the innocent victim, but a Samaritan joined him and saved him. This Samaritan is an incarnation of Jesus, his identity as the Son of God for all. This is an illustration of God's mission. The task given to us today is to present the parable of a Good Samaritan through our life stories. When we do this mission work, we will let the world see Christ Jesus dwelling among us.
