Sermon Summary

The Vision of Jesus for His Church

Summary: The vision of Jesus for his church is to make it the headquarters for the ministry of the kingdom of God for all nations, which will come true through the power of the Holy Spirit.

Jesus has a vision for his church: "After his suffering, he showed himself to these men and gave many convincing proofs that he was alive. He appeared to them over a period of forty days and spoke about the kingdom of God" (Acts 1:3).

During his forty-day stay on earth after the resurrection, he taught his disciples the Scripture, the writings of Moses, and the Prophets according to a certain subject matter, which is the kingdom of God. After his teaching for forty days, his disciples raised a question to Jesus: "Lord, is this the time when you will restore the kingdom to Israel?" (Acts 1:6) The kingdom of God was a hot topic for them. It was their major concern. And it was the vision Jesus inspired them to live for.

So when they had come together, they asked him, "Lord, is this the time when you will restore the kingdom to Israel?" He replied, "It is not for you to know the times or periods that the Father has set by his own authority. But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." (Acts 1:6-8)

After this I looked and there before me was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, tribe, people, and language, standing before the throne and in front of the Lamb. They were wearing white robes and were holding palm branches in their hands. And they cried out

"salvation belongs to our God, who sits on the throne, and to the Lamb." (Rev. 7:9-10)

First, the Kingdom of God has come true in Christ. The reality, or truth, of the kingdom of God is revealed in Jesus. The kingdom of God is Christ-centered. "What is the kingdom of God?"

The ministry of Jesus on earth is for God's kingdom. He was the agent of God's kingdom. He began his ministry with this proclamation: "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near" (Mt. 4:17); "The time has come, and the kingdom of God has come near. Repent and believe in the good news!" (Mark 1:15). Jesus came to us to fulfill God's kingdom: He proclaimed that God's kingdom had already come. Jesus cast out demons. And then he said, "But if it is by the finger of God that I cast out demons, then the kingdom of God has come to you" (NRSV). (Luke 11:20). In his ministry, his preaching, and his miraculous works, God's kingdom has come.

In the Incarnation of Jesus Christ, his crucifixion, and his resurrection, the promise of the coming of God's kingdom has been fulfilled: everything in heaven and on earth is subjected to the reign of God through Christ the Lord (Phil 2:9–11). With the coming of Christ, through his life, God has revealed his power and glory, his reign in the universe, and his ruling power over death, sin, and Satan. Paul sees the plan of God to bring his kingdom on earth to be accomplished in Christ: it is God's pleasure that all things in heaven, on earth, and under the earth, that is, everything in the universe, gather around the lordship of Christ, putting them under his reign (Eph. 1:10).

Second, God calls the church to be the messenger of God's Kingdom and the witness of Christ, embodying the identity of the church as the message of the kingdom of God. "What is the church?"

What the church should do for the vision of the kingdom of God is to witness to Christ in speech and action. It is to live for the proclamation of the gospel of Christ, in obedience to his lordship, and in imitation of his life: "You

will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth" (Acts 1:8b). Christ commanded his disciples to bear witness to him, his word, and his life: "You are my witnesses." It is the way to live according to their vision of the kingdom of God. They were called to witness to the world and all the people on earth about the kingdom of God, which has come in Christ. Christ himself is identical to God's kingdom. The thing we need for God's kingdom on earth is to bear witness to Christ. The church is the community of the kingdom of God bearing witness to Christ in words and action. The goal of the church is to witness Christ to every person everywhere on earth. It is the way of living in the vision of God's kingdom: And Jesus came and said to them, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore, go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age." (Matthew 28:18-20)

Third, the church should depend on the Holy Spirit. The strategy for the kingdom of God is living in the power of the Holy Spirit, not in our power. "How can the church make the kingdom of God come true?"

For the vision of the kingdom of God, fulfilled in Christ Jesus, Christ commanded his disciples to stay in Jerusalem and wait for the Holy Spirit to come upon them. They should not leave Jerusalem until the Holy Spirit comes on them. For their commission to bear witness to Jesus, his disciples should enter Jerusalem and wait for the coming of the Holy Spirit. They needed to do two things to perform their tasks as the witnesses of Christ Jesus: to stay in Jerusalem and wait for the Holy Spirit. These two things are the strategy of Jesus for his church to live with the vision of God's kingdom on earth.

First, Jesus commanded his disciples to go back to the city of Jerusalem. Jerusalem is the city in which he was sentenced to crucifixion. It is inevitable for the disciples of Jesus to go through the same experiences as Jesus did, such as persecution, mockery, alienation, poverty, violence, and even death, if they go back to Jerusalem. How could the disciples of Jesus perform their mission in the

city of Jerusalem, where they were expected to go through suffering, persecution, and even murder?

The only guide Jesus gave them, the only resource they should depend on, and the only strategy they should take is the Holy Spirit. The reason why Jesus put his disciples in the midst of his enemies in Jerusalem, who hated him, persecuted him, and put him to death on the cross is because the power of salvation, the progress of God's kingdom, comes from above, not from below, or from God alone, not from human power, so that they should not depend on themselves but on the Holy Spirit alone. The disciples will be engaged in warfare in the world, in Jerusalem, Samaria, and in the whole region of the Roman Empire. But their weapons are not manufactured by their hands or with their wisdom and power, but by the divine power of the Holy Spirit. The power that comes from the Spirit will destroy the strongholds against the gospel of Christ. "Indeed, we live as human beings, but we do not wage war according to human standards; for the weapons of our warfare are not merely human, but they have divine power to destroy strongholds. We destroy arguments and every proud obstacle raised up against the knowledge of God, and we take every thought captive to obey Christ" (2 Cor. 10:3-5).

Second, the Holy Spirit comes to us as the witness of Christ. The Holy Spirit is the Spirit of Christ. The major role of the Spirit is to testify to Christ. The Holy Spirit is not a mysterious, unreasonable, or impersonal power. The Spirit is the Person working on and in our humanity. The Holy Spirit comes to us and enlightens our hearts to see and understand the kingdom of God that is culminated in Christ's crucifixion and resurrection. "When he, the Spirit of the truth, comes, he will guide you into all the truth... He will bring glory to me by taking what is mine and making it known to you" (John 16:13, 14). The Holy Spirit is the Spirit of wisdom and revelation coming upon us to enlighten us to see the hope we are called to and the immeasurable power of God working through Christ, his resurrection, the power of God's kingdom, and the abundance of God's glory in Christ, the glory of his kingdom.
