2025 Michigan Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church

For me, the ABAR (Anti-Bias and Anti-Racism) program has many significances, but I am focusing on its practical and cultural significances.

This program helps me to face the issue of racism in the congregation of cross-cultural context, or white-dominant congregation, with boldness, without fear. More than seven years ago, in February 2017, I wrote my reflection on John Wesley's "Thoughts upon Slavery" and submitted it to the church's monthly magazine. This writing brought me into trouble. My church leaders came to my office and asked me to submit the replacement for my reflection on "Thoughts upon Slavery." I accommodated myself to their demand without any argument. I withdrew my writing. My primary concern was to keep my congregation peaceful and reconcilable. However, later, the husband of one of the church leaders, who came to my office because of my writing, told me that I could stay with them one more year because of the appointment system of The United Methodist Church. Since that time, in that congregation, I had continuously experienced hostility and even humiliation. I had no protection from the church leaders. I could not mention the vocabulary of 'racism.' I wondered how I should not mention John Wesley's "Thoughts upon Slavery" in my United Methodist Church. In my opinion, John Wesley's "Thoughts upon Slavery" is a crucial text that sheds light on the fundamental sin of modern European or American civilization.

This July I will lead the class in my congregation according to the requirement of the module "Anti-Racism Essentials," one of the modules of the Anti-Bias and Anti-Racism program provided by the Michigan Conference of The United Methodist Church. We are going to read and discuss John Wesley's writings; the main texts will be "Thoughts upon Slavery" and "A Plain Account of the People Called Methodist." Through "Thoughts on Slavery," we will discuss Wesley's understanding of humanity, divinity, and civilization, and through "A Plain Account of the People Called Methodist," his understanding of Methodism. Now I have no fear to lead this class because I am under the umbrella of the Michigan Conference of The United Methodist Church. My ministerial situation is not like 2017. I am not just an individual pastor but a part of the body of Christ in confronting the issue of racism. I am not a third person in the American congregational and cultural context about the racial bias present everywhere in mental, social, and cultural structures. Even I cannot be excluded from this prejudice. At this point, I feel liberated because I will eventually talk about Wesley's "Thoughts upon Slavery," which I think is one of the most important texts not only in Wesleyan tradition but also in the history of European and American civilization.

Last year, when I completed a module for Systematic Racism, I received a certificate from the Michigan Conference by email. This email concludes with a challenge to me: "ABAR Education & Training (Michigan Conference) has issued a certificate to you for completing systematic racism. What does systemic racism have to do with the Church?" So, I will lead the class for anti-racism to complete another module, "Anti-Racism Essentials." It is the requirement: "Develop a sermon series, corresponding class/study, or other activity as it best

relates to your specific setting on the praxis of Antiracism and Christian Formation in the Wesleyan Tradition." We will study John Wesley's "Thoughts on Slavery," reviewing it in the light of his other writings, and discuss the issue of racism not just as a personal matter but as a matter of social, historical, and cultural systems. Based on my experience, I have realized racism is a universal sin. We can see it everywhere, in every consciousness, whether you are conservative or liberal. It is a phenomenon or appearance of original sin. It is real and concrete, not imaginative or abstract. Sin is the breaking apart of the image of God in every person and community.

John Wesley discusses the "parent-sins" in his "Sermon on the Mount." These sins are not merely inherited from the first human being, Adam, but also from generation to generation and spread out to all nations, so they are historical, systematic, and permeated into our consciousness, speech, and action, "continually springing up, infecting all our words, and tainting all our actions." So, sin is not only a matter of personhood but also social and cultural life. It is wide and broad, contaminating all areas of humanity—personal, social, and historical. It disguises itself as unrecognizable and banal to everybody. Racism embodies parent-sins in our personal, social, and cultural structure. It is a phenomenal form of the banality of evil, in terms of Hannah Arendt, a Jewish philosopher exiled to New York, escaping from the German totalitarian regime. Arendt stood against antisemitism and Zionism. For her, racism is the origin of totalitarianism.

I deeply appreciate the Michigan Conference of The United Methodist Church for providing **ABAR** (**Anti-Bias and Anti-Racism**). This program makes it possible to read "Thoughts upon Slavery" with my congregation and brings me into the feeling of gratefulness and liberation. Eventually, I can discuss "Thoughts upon Slavery" in my pastoral and congregation contexts. It is a revolutionary step in my ministry. This revolution is not from bottom to up, but from up to bottom. But it is for the people at the bottom of social, cultural, and political structure. It is not only for the so-called "non-whites" but also for the whites because it makes upside down the system of injustice and hatred, setting us free from the universal or original sin of racism. The ecclesiastical structure of The United Methodist Church makes it possible. Without the structural support of The United Methodist Church, I am not sure how I can sustain my ministry in the crosscultural context. I cannot imagine it.

Bishop David Alan Bard has established this program so I can practice John Wesley's antiracism in my pastoral situation. The bishop's leadership is not a coercion but an incarnation of the vision of The United Methodist Church to transform the world by making disciples of every nation, every race, every tribe, and every language. The (ABAR) anti-bias & antiracism program is about fundamental Christianity in opposition to the structure of sins, the so-called parent sins, testified to by the whole Scripture and the history of human beings. It is, can be, or should be considered one of the contemporary Christian movements of reformation.

Sermon Summary

The Smyrnaean Church in Eternal Richness (Revelation 2:8-11)

Summary: Christians, who live faithfully to Jesus, even to the point of death, will participate in the resurrection life, the abundant life in eternity, after their suffering even to the point of death.

Jesus, the First and the Last, who died and came to life again:

Revelation 2:8 These are the words of him who is the First and the Last, who died and came to life again.

Christ is God the Son. He is the First and the Last. He existed before the creation of the universe. He will come again at the end of history. He is the beginning of God's salvation history, whose conclusion is his second coming. Christ manifested his divinity through his death on the cross and resurrection from the dead. He has become the first fruit of the resurrection of all who belong to him. Everyone who participates in his suffering will reap the resurrection life at the end of history and in God's eternal kingdom. Christ is always faithful to us. He commands his church to be consistent with his gospel.

The Christians in Smyrna are in union with Christ, his death and resurrection.

Rev. 2:9 I know your afflictions and your poverty – yet you are rich! I know about the slander of those who say they are Jews and are not but are a synagogue of Satan.

First, the Christians in Smyrna are persecuted and impoverished because they reject emperor worship due to their faith in Jesus as the First and the Last. Jesus proved his identity as the Alpha and the Omega through his crucifixion and resurrection. These Christians showed their faithfulness to Christ, rejecting idolatry and risking their lives, wealth, and honors. They became poor and powerless. For them, the object of worship is Christ alone, not anything or anyone in the world. They had no fear of evil power threatening their safety and security.

Second, the Christians in Smyrna suffer not only from those outside their Christian community but also from those inside it, who identify themselves as Jews. These Jews belong to "a synagogue of Satan," even though they attended the worship service in the Christian community in Smyrna. They slander against the Christians in suffering and poverty. They belong to the same group of people who persecuted Jesus, rejected him and his lordship, and killed him. They distorted the gospel of Christ: "I know about the slander of those who say they are Jews and are not but are a synagogue of Satan." The

Christians suffering from many things, standing against the emperor worship in Smyrna, are the real Jews, the people of the kingdom of God representing the image of Christ, the servant of suffering and poverty, the crucified Lord.

The Church in Smyrna in Faithfulness to Jesus, the First and the Last

Rev. 2:10 Do not be afraid of what you are about to suffer, I tell you, the devil will put some of you in prison to test you, and you will suffer persecution for ten days. Be faithful, even to the point of death, and I will give you life as your victor's crown.

Rev. 2:11 Whoever has ears, let them hear what the Spirit says to the churches. The one who is victorious will not be hurt at all by the second death.

Faith means faithfulness. Jesus commands the Christians in Smyrna to be faithful to him with consistency in their faith. Their victory is in their faithfulness to him, not giving it up in suffering, even facing death. God's grace keeps them in loyalty to Jesus. The consequence of their faithfulness is their participation in the resurrection life of Jesus Christ. The Smyrnaean Christians have been confronted with physical, psychological, and spiritual difficulties, such as affliction and poverty, and the slander of the Jews, a synagogue of Satan (Rev. 2:9). What is waiting for them is the test of the devil: some of them will be put in prison. Christians in Smyrna will "suffer persecution for ten days" (Rev. 2:10). However, ultimately, after being persecuted, they will receive the crown of life from Christ (Rev. 2:10). Their final future is victory and glory in Christ.

The richness of the Christians in Smyrna is in the kingdom of God, which is their inheritance in Christ the Lord. However, they are rich because they participate in the suffering of Christ and will join in his resurrection life. Their richness is their acceptance of the new life in Christ and their fellowship with him in his death and resurrection. How can they conquer the persecution and the test by Satan? Their faithfulness to Christ with their full commitment to him is the way to be victorious over all the difficulties in their life, such as affliction, poverty, slanderous talk against them, persecution, and imprisonment. Christ Jesus will reward them with the crown of life, the ultimate victory over the world hostile to them. In their afflictions and poverty, they fix their eyes on Jesus, crying out to God the Father for their salvation. God will reward them with his kingdom in eternity. It is eternal life. They will not lose it. Suffering in this world for the sake of Christ is a way of entering the blessings of God's kingdom.

Rom. 8:17. Now if we are children, then we are heirs – heirs of God and coheirs with Christ, if indeed we share in his sufferings in order that we may also share in his glory.

And so, in remembrance of these your mighty acts in Jesus Christ, we offer ourselves in praise and thanksgiving as a holy and living sacrifice, in union with Christ's offering for us, as we proclaim the mystery of faith.
