Sermon Summary

The Blessed Life for God's People (Psalm 1)

Summary: The blessed life is the life in faithfulness to God's covenant, in which the Word of God flourishes, and we are continuously being renewed according to the image of Christ.

1. Understanding the background of Psalm 1 - the covenant relationship between God and the people of Israel

God's faithfulness to His covenant with Abraham: God promised Abraham to make his children a great nation (Gen. 12:2). God also made a covenant with him that he would bring them out of slavery and give them the land of Canaan (Gen. 15:18). God was faithful to his covenant with Abraham. As he promised to him, God took an action to deliver his offspring from the oppression in the land of Egypt. Through his deliverance, God showed his faithfulness to the covenant he made with Abraham.

The faithfulness of the people of Israel to God's covenant is demanded: God separated Israel as his treasured possession out of other nations so that God the Lord was their king, and he bound them to obey him. The people of Israel could count on him to keep his promises, including both his promises of blessing and his threats of judgment. Their wellbeing was determined by what they would do with God the Lord.

2. The subject matter of Psalm 1 – the life in faithfulness to God's covenant

Psalm 1 reminded the Israelites of their covenant relationship with God and also of their history—what had happened to them when they were faithful or unfaithful to their covenant with God. This psalm reflects the subject matter of the history of Israel. The people of Israel were called into the covenant relationship with God, according to which they were commanded to live in the covenant faithfulness to God. They were called to live as a priestly nation and a holy nation (Ex. 19:6). They should live according to God's covenant with them.

3. Two kinds of God's people in Psalm 1 – Those in disobedience or in obedience to God's covenant

Those who live in unfaithfulness to the covenant relationship with God: Ps. 1:1 describes the people of God living in disobedience to God's covenant. They listened to "the advice of the wicked," which denies the knowledge of God the creator and the redeemer, and became futile in their thinking and senseless in their mind (Rom. 1:21). Then, they put the wisdom of the wicked into practice; they took the path that sinners tread

(Ps. 1:1). Finally, they sat "in the seat of scoffers" (Ps. 1:1). They deified themselves and put everything under the rule of their desire and their knowledge without God.

Those who live in faithfulness to the covenant relationship with God: Ps. 1:2 describes the life of the people of God living in the covenant faithfulness to God: "Their delight is in the law of the LORD, and on his law they meditate day and night" (Ps. 1:2). They accepted the Word of God given to them through Moses and the prophets as the authority to rule the whole area of their life. Further, by keeping the Law of Moses and the prophets in their lives, they showed their faithfulness to God. Their delight in the Word of God was their way of living according to the covenant relationship with God.

4. Covenant faithfulness in the core Christian doctrine by John Wesley – Original Sin, Justification by Faith, and Sanctification

Original sin as a human condition: Original sin is the fundamental problem of human beings. It is inherent in human nature. Sin is a separation from God and an alienation from the life of God and a rebellion against God's sovereign rule. It is a breakdown of the relationship with God and "an exchange of the relationship with God for a relationship with the forces of evil in the world" (Rom. 1:25).

Justification by God's grace: As God promised in the law and the prophets, God sent Jesus Christ to us and made him as God's righteousness so that "all who believe" in him, no matter who they are, "are now justified by his grace, receiving as a gift "the redemption that is in Christ Jesus" (Rom. 3:21-24). God's righteousness is inherited toward them. We are made righteous by "the grace of God and the free gift of the one man, Jesus Christ" (Rom. 5:15).

Sanctification as faithfulness to God's grace: Now we are called to live according to God's grace and in obedience to the gospel of Christ, manifesting our new life in Christ through our holiness. Justification by faith leads to sanctification in the whole area of life. We are demanded to live in the covenant faithfulness to God, "being renewed in knowledge according to the image of its creator," Christ (Col. 3:10).

5. Conclusion

What is the blessed life? What is prosperity in our life? It is our faithfulness to God's grace in Christ. It is not the life in which our worldly desire becomes prosperous, but the life in which God's grace in Christ becomes fruitful. God shows his faithfulness to his people through Christ and calls them to live in faithfulness to his grace. We never stop growing up to the full measurement of the knowledge of Christ and his image. What is to be flourished in our life is not our ambitious desire but the Word of God, not us but Christ alone.

Exciting News!

First, a quick update: Six members of your Church Family, the A/V Task Group, have been working behind the scenes to improve both our sanctuary and online audio/visual experience. We've addressed long-standing concerns from the congregation, Governance Board, and musical groups. After consulting with Simoni Systems, technicians visited the church to evaluate and adjust our equipment.

While some improvements were made, our current A/V system—now 15 to 30 years old—is outdated and challenging for volunteers to use. Simoni has recommended upgrades to our projection, camera, and sound systems. Given the system's age, we're starting with the **sound system**, with new components and staff training estimated at **\$16,000**.

Now for the exciting part!

An **anonymous donor has pledged to match up to \$7,500** in congregation donations made by **mid-October**! That means we only need to raise **\$8,500 over the next 10 weeks** to move forward.

Fundraising kickoff begins today, Sunday, July 27.
