I Am a Church Member – Functioning & Unifying

Key Thoughts

- 1. The "big C" Church is the global body of believers; the "little c" church is the local gathering through which we live out faith together.
- 2. Every believer is called to be a *functioning* part of the body—actively engaged in disciple-making, not parked on the sidelines.
- 3. Unity is not sameness but shared purpose: different gifts, one Spirit; different callings, one Lord.
- 4. A functional church without unity burns out; a unified church without function stagnates.
- 5. When we are both functional and unified, the world sees the beauty of Christ and hears the gospel through His people.

Discussion Questions

(Write responses in the space provided.)

- 1. What stood out to you about the distinction between the "big C" and "little c" church?
- 2. In what ways might believers today find themselves "parked in the driveway" spiritually?
- 3. Read Matthew 28:19-20. What part of the Great Commission do you personally find easiest—or hardest—to live out?
- 4. How does 1 Corinthians 12:4-7 challenge your view of unity and diversity in the Church?

- 5. Think about Pastor Chris's guitar illustration. What happens when one "finger" (member) refuses to play its part?
- 6. What practical steps could our group take to strengthen both function *and* unity at Sonrise this month?
