A LETTER FROM DEACON ED...

Dear teens,

THE SPIRITUALITY OF FUNDRAISING

- 2. Recognizing the Goodness of Fund-Raising:** View fund-raising positively, as an opportunity to invite others to participate in God's work and connect with a meaningful mission.
- 3. Seeing Fund-Raising as a Call to Conversion:** Approach fund-raising as a chance for personal transformation, shifting from self-centeredness to stewardship and service to others.
- 4. Embracing Fund-Raising as a Ministry:** Understand fund-raising as a spiritual practice, fostering relationships, and inviting others to share in a common vision.
- 5. Cultivating Trust and Prayer in Fund-Raising:** Foster trust in God's guidance and provision, supported by a prayerful attitude throughout the fund-raising process.
- 6. Inviting Others into the Joy of Giving:** Extend an invitation to others to experience the joy of generosity and participate in the mission's impact.
- 7. Nurturing Relationships with Donors:** Recognize the value of building meaningful connections with donors, fostering a sense of community and shared purpose.
- 8. Creating a Culture of Gratitude and Celebration:** Cultivate an environment of gratitude, expressing appreciation for donors and celebrating the impact of their contributions.
- 9. Integrating Fund-Raising into the Mission and Vision of the Community:** Align fund-raising efforts with the larger mission and vision, ensuring coherence and a sense of purpose.
- 10. Practicing Stewardship and Accountability:** Exercise responsible stewardship over resources, ensuring transparency, accountability, and wise use of funds.

These principles provide a holistic framework for approaching fund-raising as a spiritual practice, emphasizing trust, gratitude, relationship-building, and aligning efforts with a larger mission and vision.

A LESSON FROM ST. PAUL

TRUSTING IN GOD'S PLAN

St. Paul demonstrated a deep trust in God's provision throughout his ministry. Despite facing numerous challenges, opposition, and even personal hardships, he remained steadfast in his faith, relying on God's abundant grace and guidance.

St. Paul's approach to fundraising can be seen in his letters to the early Christian communities, where he appeals to them for financial support. He viewed fundraising not as a burden or a necessary evil, but as an opportunity for the community to actively participate in the mission of spreading the Gospel. St. Paul recognized that the work of evangelization required resources, and he invited others to contribute generously to support the mission.

Moreover, St. Paul's understanding of fundraising was rooted in his conviction that giving was an act of spiritual transformation. In his second letter to the Corinthians, he writes about the grace of giving and encourages them to give cheerfully, as God loves a cheerful giver. He believed that fundraising was not just about financial transactions but about the spiritual growth and formation of both the giver and the receiver.

St. Paul's life and teachings align with Nouwen's emphasis on building relationships and forming connections in fundraising. St. Paul sought to develop deep and meaningful relationships with the communities he served, fostering a sense of unity and shared purpose. He understood that fundraising was not merely about obtaining resources, but about creating a community of support and involvement.

Overall, St. Paul's life of evangelization reflects Nouwen's notion that fundraising is more than a practical endeavor; it is a spiritual practice that involves trust, gratitude, and a deep connection to God's work. St. Paul's example demonstrates that fundraising, when approached with the right mindset and rooted in faith, can be a means to invite others into the mission, deepen spiritual growth, and foster a vibrant and generous community.



STUDENT FUNDRAISING - Getting Started

This journey isn't just about raising money—it's about stepping into a mission. Fundraising is a way to invite others to join in what God is doing in you, through you and through the Church. Ready to begin?

1. Set Your Goal

Before asking for support, identify what you'll need. Your goal may go beyond the basic event cost—consider things like a passport, supplies, immunizations, or travel gear.

2. Bring It to Prayer

Once you know your goal, bring it to God in prayer.

Ask for:

- 🙏 Clarity – Is this the right amount?
- 💡 Wisdom – What gifts has God given me to help raise these funds?
- 💪 Fortitude – To persevere even when it's hard

Prayer will keep you rooted and remind you that this journey is spiritual, not just financial.



3. Know Your “Why”

Why do you want to go on this trip?

- Grow in your faith?
- Strengthen friendships at church?
- Step outside your comfort zone and serve others?
- Experience the Larger Church?

Whatever your reason, own it. Be excited about it. Be ready to share it in less than three minutes, and be prepared to go deeper when people ask more questions.

4. Make a Plan:

- Expect the unexpected and don't be shy about sending letters!

A. Family Contacts (family members + connections)

- Family members > parents, siblings, aunts, uncles, grandparents
- Parents' friends > church friends, childhood friends, wedding participants/guests
- Parents' contacts > bible study members/leaders, co-workers, colleagues Family acquaintances > family doctor, mechanic, priest

B. Personal Contacts

- Classes/school > professors, teachers, classmates
- Clubs/teams/groups > teammates, coaches, bible study leaders, friends Housing > roommates, parents of roommates
- Jobs/summer jobs/internships > co-workers, bosses, colleagues
- Church > CCD and RCIA teachers/peers, priests, youth ministers

C. Community Contacts (those you believe have a stake in sharing Christ)

5. PRACTICAL PREPARATION

- Purchase all necessary fundraising materials: paper, stamps, pens, thank you notes, etc.
- Create a system that allows you to track your communication and donations, should be the same list as the name storming including:
 - Priority
 - Name
 - Phone
 - Email
 - Home Address
 - Appeal letter sent
 - Follow-up phone call
 - Further follow-up needed?
 - Committed amount (check number, if applicable)
 - Thank you sent
 - Newsletter sent
- Write your personal appeal letter template (see sharing with others)
- Write a phone script (see sharing with others)
- Know how you can accept donations
- Be Prepared to speak with others, don't just rely on electronic communications.
- Plan at least a weekly time to sit down and work on fundraising

HOW TO ACCEPT DONATIONS

Know how you are going to accept donations and keep track of donations.

1. Online donation by credit card or EFT (preferred)

The link to our page can be found by going to <https://staynm.churchcenter.com/giving> or your personal Giving page and Selecting your name

2. Check (least preferred option):

Arrange a time to pick it up, or ask them to mail it to you so you can ensure accuracy

Must be made payable to St. Thomas Aquinas (this is necessary to achieve tax-exempt status)

Must include your MISSION Fund - (your name) (provide this to them) in the memo line

Keep a record of the check number and amount

You must turn in any checks you receive to St. Thomas Aquinas within one week:

STUDENT FUNDRAISING - Sharing with others

1. PRAY

Pray, focus yourself, and humbly ask God to provide for this mission He's called you to. Entrust all aspects of fundraising to Him!

2. TELL PEOPLE

Start sharing your plans with the people around you—everyone you meet can be a part of your journey. Whether you're serving at Mass, singing in the choir, hanging out at school, on your team, or at work, let others know that you're preparing for something meaningful.

And remember: you're not sharing just so they can give you money. You're inviting them to pray for you and to walk with you spiritually as you get ready for this encounter with Christ.

This trip is about more than travel—it's about transformation. People will be moved by your commitment, and you may be surprised by how God inspires them to support you, sometimes in ways you never expected. Their prayers, encouragement, and presence will be part of your preparation.

💬 “We are the Body of Christ—and the Body moves together.”
Let others in. Let them lift you up in prayer. This isn't just your journey—it's ours.

3 . WRITE & SEND APPEAL LETTERS (CONTINUED)

- Draft your appeal letter, including the following (see Appendix for example):
- Date - when you are writing the letter
- Greeting - Dear _____,
- Introduction - Connect with your reader; bring them up to date with what you're doing
- Information - Share what you will do on mission, why you've decided to participate, and what you hope to accomplish
- Needs - State your financial needs and your fundraising deadlines
- Invitation - Involve your reader by asking them to cover a specific portion of the trip cost and commit to following up with them by telephone within a specific time frame
- Practicals - Direct them to your the Fundraising Webpage via your link (create a shorter one at tinyurl.com/!) or instruct them on how to donate by check
- Conclusion - Acknowledge your relationship again with an emphasis on
- appreciation, partnership, and commitment
- Contact Information - Make sure they can reach you by sharing your
- telephone number, address, and e-mail
- Signature - Type out your name but be sure to sign in ink as well!
- Add a personal touch to your printed appeal letters so your mission partners know you care about them and not only their gift:
- Sign each letter by hand and add a handwritten P.S.
- Handwrite addresses on the envelope; they'll be more likely to open it!

STUDENT FUNDRAISING - Sharing with others

4. CALL

- One week after sending out your appeal letters, give your potential donors a call to see if they would like to support your mission trip
- Many people will want to help you but won't actually donate unless you reach out
- Always be gracious and courteous!
- Directing your phone call (see Appendix for sample script):
- Introduce yourself and then briefly mention the letter you sent
- Explain your mission trip and share what you hope to see God do as a result of your time on mission
- Remind them of the financial needs you mentioned in your letter, and ask them if they would commit to joining your support team
- Be sure to get a specific number! ("Do you know how much that will be?")
- THANK them!
- Walk them through making the payment (see Ways to Donate)
- Always ask them to refer you to other people who might also have a heart for your mission

6. THANK YOU NOTES

Write a quick thank you note as soon as someone agrees to support you Use professionalism and communicate gratitude

Mail within 24-48 hours

7. FOLLOW-UP NEWSLETTER

"Some give by going, and others go by giving" – help your mission partners GO with you on your mission by sharing your experience (see Appendix for example)

Verbally describe the main portions of your mission experience, and explain how the external actions affected you internally

Include lots of pictures

Writing a follow-up letter increases donor confidence and the likelihood that they will support missionaries in the future

IMPORTANT NOTES

Donations

Your fundraising goal is an estimate of the total cost for the trip. Your goal may increase or decrease based on various factors (ex: fluctuations in air fare) Anything above and beyond your personal fundraising goal will go toward the account balance for the trip as a whole. In order to cover travel to the departure city, it is acceptable to appeal to specific mission partners or to retain funds from any checks written to you personally. However, these gifts of cash or check are not tax-deductible

Due to tax laws, St. Thomas Aquinas cannot legally reimburse any money that you have donated from your own personal funds If you receive a cash donation you may either

(1) deposit the cash in your account and use it for your personal incidentals and travel to your departure city,

(2) deposit the amount into your account and make an online donation on their behalf, or

(3) send a check payable to "**St. Thomas Aquinas** " In the memo write **Mission fund** toward your trip fee

(*cash donations are not tax-deductible)

IMPORTANT NOTES

Withdrawal from your trip

If you do not meet your fundraising deadlines, you run the risk of being prohibited from participating on the trip. If, at any time, you must withdraw from the trip, all donations you have turned in to St. Thomas Aquinas are non refundable. If you withdraw from a trip at any point, you are required to pay for any remaining balance of expenditures that have been, or will need to be, covered in your name. If you are prevented from attending due to extenuating circumstances (ex: death in the family, serious medical conditions, etc.), you must immediately contact Dcn. Ed to make a claim with the travel insurance company. If travel insurance has not yet been purchased, the matter will be handled on a case by case bases with St. Thomas Aquinas . No refunds are guaranteed through St. Thomas Aquinas in any situation

Soliciting Online Support

We ask that you do not create a Facebook "event" (or similar use of any other social media platform) to raise money for your mission trip due to its impersonal nature. Please talk to Deacon Ed about acceptable ways to fundraise using social media.

Sample Appeal Letter - APPENDIX A

Sample Follow Up Phone Ask - APPENDIX B

"Hi (Aunt Lucy), it's (Your Name)—how are you?"

(Allow for a quick exchange of small talk, but gently move the conversation forward.)

"I'm so glad to hear that! I just wanted to follow up and see if you happened to receive the letter I sent about my upcoming (mission trip/retreat/summer camp/conference)?"

(If yes) – "That's great! I'm really looking forward to this experience—it's going to be an amazing opportunity to grow in faith and serve others. I wanted to check in to see if you had any questions and if you'd be interested in supporting me."

(If no) – "No worries! I'd love to quickly tell you a little bit about it. I've been invited to go on a trip with our youth ministry to (destination/event name), where I'll be able to grow spiritually, serve others, and deepen my relationship with God. It's a big step for me, and I'm asking for both prayer and financial support to help make it possible."

If they say YES to giving:

"Thank you so much! That means a lot to me. My goal is to raise (\$2,500), and I'm keeping track of the gifts I receive. Would you consider making a gift of (\$250 or another suggested amount)? Every bit really helps!"

(Feel free to adjust the amount depending on your relationship or what's realistic.)

"There are two ways you can give. The easiest is online through my personal fundraising link: (insert link here). Or, if you prefer, you can write a check made out to St. Thomas Youth Missions. Just send it to me, and I'll make sure it gets turned in properly. Both options are tax-deductible."

(Make sure to explain clearly what they should include with a check: your name and the event name in the memo line.)

If they say NO or can't give financially right now:

"I totally understand, and I really appreciate you taking the time to talk with me. Even if financial support isn't possible right now, would you consider praying for me and for everyone going on this trip? That kind of support means so much."

(End with warmth and gratitude.)

"Thank you again, (Aunt Lucy). I'm really grateful for your encouragement. I'll keep you posted as I prepare for the trip!"

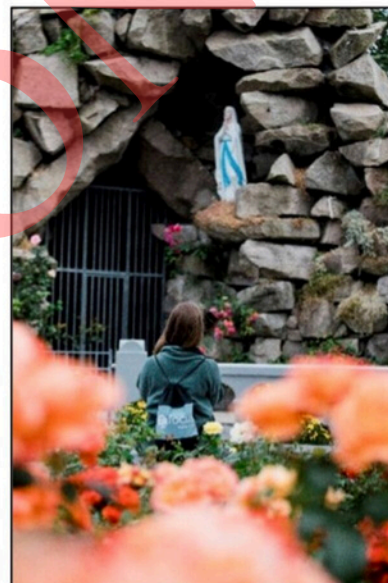

Dear Aunt Maruska and Uncle Nicky,

September 5, 2019

If had to describe my entire mission trip to Ireland in three words I would say: challenging, inspiring, and exciting. Challenging, because not only did it continuously push me to step out of my comfort zone, but it challenged me to reexamine my life. Inspiring, because after spending two and a half weeks with some of the greatest people I have ever met, I became incredibly aware of the Lord's call for all Catholics to live extraordinary lives with the sole purpose of striving for Heaven. And exciting, because Ireland made me realize that God's plan for me is greater than I could ever image and now that I am back, I am more excited than ever to fully live the event that is life.

From July 8th to the 24th, I was privileged to live and serve with 18 other college missionaries in the great country of Ireland. We spent our first week in the town of Castlebar, in County Mayo, at the Church of the Holy Rosary working with a group of young adults, ages 13-26. During our time there, we had the great joy of working alongside Fr. Shane Sullivan (pictured at [bottom] left), who is one of the greatest priests I have ever met. In just one week we visited the Cliffs of Moher; Galway City; Máméan—a beautiful pilgrimage in Connemara which ends at the Mass Rock where St. Patrick bestowed his blessing on all of Connemara, Ireland; participated in the Church of the Holy Rosary's family day, and ended with a pilgrimage to Our Lady of Knock [after many other adventures]. After leaving Castlebar, we spent the next 5 days in Cork doing street ministry, working alongside the Dominican friars. It pushed many of us to step outside ourselves in order to share the faith with everyone we encountered. I learned how to courageously stand up for the faith without fear of rejection[.]

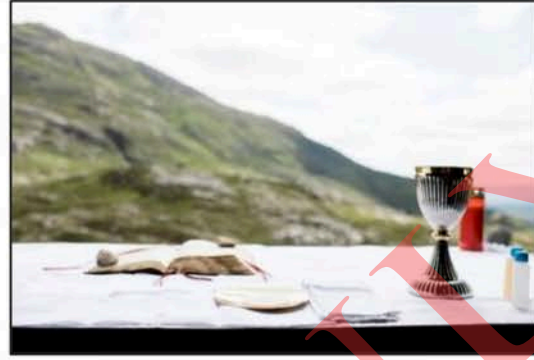


It also gave us the opportunity to learn how to love the people in front of us, regardless of our surroundings and discomfort. In fact, one of the most powerful experiences of my mission occurred on our pilgrimage to Máméan—a pilgrimage that was full of discomfort and distraction. As we walked along [Mamean], a young man by the name of Christopher fell into step next to me and the two of us began one of the most powerful conversations I have ever been a part of, a conversation that was inspired by my testimony. As our conversation slowly came to an end, I could see on Christopher's face that something inside of him had changed; something great had

happened. This young man had finally encountered the Lord in very beautiful and intimate way, something which was made abundantly clear to me on our last day in Castlebar, when we found that he had slipped a letter through our mail slot thanking us for changing his life.

My life, much like Christopher's, was truly changed by our time in Ireland. The mission made me realize how greatly I desire to have the Lord in my life; it made me realize that the Lord is calling me to greatness; and it made me realize that my desire to serve others is not only obtainable, but that it is a gift from God. The Lord blessed me in more ways than I could have ever imagined possible, so I want to thank you from the bottom of my heart for helping me get to Ireland and for praying for me and my team as we served. My mission trip to Ireland is one of the greatest experiences of my life. It was made possible by your prayers and generosity, so again I say, "Thank you," for enabling me to not only grow in my Catholic faith, but also for enabling to me to share my faith with others.

I will continue praying for you and if there is anything new that I can be praying for, please don't hesitate to let me know. Also, if you have questions or simply want more details about the trip, I am more than willing to answer any and all questions.

CALENDAR FUNDRAISER - APPENDIX E

A Calendar fundraiser is a creative and engaging way to raise funds for a cause or organization. The concept involves participants selecting a specific day of the month and making a donation corresponding to that day. For example, if someone chooses the first of the month, they would donate at least \$1, and if they select the 20th, they would contribute at least \$20.

Here's how the Calendar fundraiser typically works:

1. **Setting the month and event date:** First, you need to determine the month during which the fundraiser will take place. It is preferable to align it with the month of the event or a month relevant to your cause.
2. **Creating a calendar:** Prepare a calendar grid for that month, listing all the days from the 1st to the last day of the month. The calendar can be displayed physically or digitally, depending on your preference and audience.
3. **Promoting participation:** Spread the word about the fundraiser and encourage people to participate by selecting a day on the calendar. You can use various channels such as social media, email newsletters, flyers, and personal outreach to engage potential donors.

8. **Acknowledgment and gratitude:** Express gratitude to the participants for their contributions. You can publicly recognize them on social media, send personalized thank-you notes, or hold a special event or ceremony to appreciate their support.

Ensure transparency and communicate how the raised funds will be utilized for the cause or organization.

By organizing a Calendar fundraiser, you can engage your community, generate excitement, and raise funds for a worthwhile cause while providing a tangible representation of progress as the calendar fills up day by day.
