I've been thinking... the circle of seasons

I once imagined a first century in the year of our Lord way of understanding the span of years we all live in and I decided to describe that span as the seasons of our lives. The first season is the earliest: we are born in a time and place, and to a family. From then on we hear our name and learn a language with an accent that come automatically. In the first season a family, small or large, loves protects and teaches us, often with celebrations. This is the season that I'll call the Jewish Period, the time of building and growing up. People around us in our neighborhood train us, recognize our skills and strengths, and begin to learn from us our desires. The first season lasts for a time that goes by too fast and then arrives at doorways that are usually ajar because growing up with talents, strengths and desires moves us through that door into a second season. I'll call it the Greek Period of our life.

Here we usually look more like everyone else of our own age. I wear the same clothes with the same REI backpack for notebooks and energy bars and my own iPhone. I am aware of myself; traditions are not as automatic or set in place as before. This is my time for taking risks I would not dare when I was younger. This is after all the Greek Season. For me it is a time of heavy weighted learning, of opening doors not ajar. It is a time of my thoughts, of my meaning and desires that I wonder about owning. It is marked by testing of what deserves my deciding and my trusting as true and good. Somewhere at the edge of this season my mind and my heart is focused with the boldness of personal commitment that settles my life with the one who shares the same and so we each enter the third season. I call this the Roman Period of life.

We are now more like owners than imaginers. In this season the rewards of learning and the increase of skills make the chances of permanence a real possibility for another bold commitment and together we choose to receive the gift of new life in the births of our children who now we will name, protect, teach and who we will watch as they make their own entry through a door ajar. In this season my concerns are now more about steadiness and traffic safety than swiftness, risks and speed.


With all of the ownership and authority of the Roman time there comes with maturity a longing to experience the full circle of all seasons. The full circle is better than staying either in or returning to any one season as if we really could. I need all three together: the traditions and people of the Jewish period; the adventure and discovery of the Greek period; the responsibility and wisdom of the Roman period. And best of all I can live as a follower of the Lord of the whole of life in every season.

On April 28th at a joyous event, my wife, Shirley, and I experienced the presence of the full circle of seasons before us as we were privileged to be present for the dedication of the University Ministries house that quite by surprise to us is named "Palmer House." We are so grateful to the members and friends of University Presbyterian Church for this high honor. I came as a young pastor in 1956 as minister to high school and college students here. This vital

presence of Christ centered ministry to university students has thrived in this place because the congregation of men and women in the seasons of their own lives cared to share the good news with a generation of young men and women who are at the door ajar season of their lives. We are profoundly thankful to the Lord and we join in prayer with you who share in this loving outreach to a company of young men and women who look very much like other generations before - just add back packs, energy bars and iPhones.

How have you felt welcomed into this space? I'm in the Palmer House almost every day studying, and even the office space above the main floor is welcoming. The UMin staff offers up their empty desks to whoever needs them.

How is the Palmer House served as a resource for you as a student? My relationships with my peers have strengthened immensely. The Palmer House is also a great place to potentially get help from another student on an assignment, which can be hard in all of the huge libraries on campus.

How has the Palmer House helped strengthen your faith? Spending time with people who have a common focus, even those from other schools, has really strengthened some Christian relationships I might not have had otherwise.

Before and after my commute every day, it's great to feel connected in my area by just walking through The Palmer House and seeing who's around.

What Else is Earl up to Now?

You can find Earl most days at his desk hard at work writing his next book. You will not be surprised to know that he is focusing on "exposition" of the Biblical text, a subject that has been the mark of his 63 years of ministry. He is constructing a manuscript, chapter, by chapter explaining the importance of and how he prepares sermons. "I can think of no more exciting task in our age, so often adrift and yet underneath it all so hungry for the real, than to have the privilege of sharing in the witness to Jesus Christ, the same yesterday, today, and tomorrow."
