I've been thinking... and asking the question "How do we keep our outlook positive and our minds healthy when there are real stresses that crowd in upon the space and time where we live our lives?"

I believe the apostle Paul is a man who managed to keep his head clear and his equilibrium in the midst of such stress. He tells us how in a letter he wrote to friends at Philippi who were concerned about his well being during his imprisonment in Rome. Paul reassures with these words, "Not that I am alluding to want for I have learned to find resources in myself whatever my circumstances. I know what it is to be brought low, and I know what it is to have plenty. I have been very thoroughly initiated into the human lot with all its ups and downs – fullness and hunger, plenty and want. I have strength for anything through him who gives me power" (Phil 4:11-13 NEB).

Paul makes use of a Greek word for sanity – *outarkes* – in these sentences. In some translations of this text the word is rendered *content* – "For I have learned to be content with whatever I have" (NRSV Phil 4:11). This is a combined word, *auto* (I, myself) combined with *akeo* (enough). It describes saneness of a person as one who is functioning with a wholesome connection to his or her self, and then is able to keep a clear mind that finds stability in what is solid and the real. Paul credits the living presence of his Lord as the one who enables an ordinary disciple like himself or the Philippian friends to take in stride both good circumstances and dangerous ones: "I can do all things through him who strengthens me" (NRSV Phil. 4:13).

Earlier in the same fourth chapter of Philippians, Paul clearly identifies the one who is that living presence as he writes, "Farewell; I wish you all joy in the Lord. I will say it again, all joy be yours. Let your magnanimity be manifest to all. The Lord is near; have no anxiety, but in everything make your requests known to God in prayer and petition with thanksgiving. Then the peace of God, which is beyond our utmost understanding, will keep guard over your hearts and your thoughts in Christ Jesus" (Phil 4:4-7 NEB).

Paul could have challenged the believers to move in a totally different direction; he might have urged the people to show to others their zeal or perhaps their intense sharply focused action. Instead, he uses a mellow word, which is one of the New Testament love words. This word is *epieikes*, sometimes translated kindness, or forbearance. Paul trusts this moderate word because the Lord is the one who is alongside. In a very healthy and nourishing way he urges his friends in Christ to be calm and moderate.

For me, one of the best parts of Paul's case for wholeness and a healthy mind is his

The secret for St. Paul is that he is always learning – he writes midstory in his own life and to friends who are also mid-story in their own lives. He wants them to know that learning how to cope with the challenges of his century is an ongoing, doable process. And what makes this learning apprenticeship all the more meaningful and joyous is that we are not alone, the teacher is nearby.

On the Road with EPM ... by Stephen Michel

These first few months with Earl Palmer Ministries has been both a learning and rewarding experience. Before coming on board with EPM I had not been very interested in C.S. Lewis outside of *The Chronicles of Narnia*. That changed when I traveled to Florida to the Dioceses and listened to Earl lecture on the life and work of C.S. Lewis. I became curious about C.S. Lewis, and I was encouraged by the simple life principles he seemed to live by. He encouraged people to push back against cynicism because of the negative impact it has on people, and to understand that people are drawn to goodness. I was challenged to cherish the people around me more and to stop focusing on the negative but instead search for the goodness in each person. The next main event I attended with Earl was the Seminar at Princeton. This was a great time of learning for not only me, but for everyone who attended. I had never experienced such a thorough unfolding of a book of the Bible. Earl's walkthrough of II Timothy was tremendous. I do not think I will be able to look at the text in the same way again. Óne particular passage stood out: II Timothy 2:14. Here, Paul urges people to avoid warfare" over words and not be argumentative in presenting the gospel. This observation revealed a deeper understanding of that passage and moved me to be more careful in arguments: to respect the other person and their point of view.

Now and Then...Reflections on My Experience with EPM

I recently interviewed several of the Study Assistants/Interns who have been a part of the EPM team over the past several years. Here are two questions I asked and some of the responses: (1) What have you been doing since you left EPM? (2) In what ways did your year with EPM impact what you are doing now?

- I finished my Master of Divinity at Princeton Theological Seminary and recently accepted a call as Associate Pastor at Trinity Presbyterian Church in San Carlos, CA, where my wife and I now live. The most significant impact has been the mentorship I received in preaching...Earl was able to help me bring the Bible alive. I cherish the memories, and the time has shaped my pastoral identity for the better. *Reverend Kurt Heineman* (2008-09)
- After my year with EPM, I went to Gordon-Conwell Theological Seminary where I received my M.DIV in 2013. After graduating, I moved back to the Seattle area and began working at Bellevue Presbyterian Church, where I am currently an Associate Pastor focusing on Men's Ministry, New Members and Hospitality. I got officially ordained in the PC(USA) in May 2015. It impacted me tremendously. It was during and through my year with Earl that I felt and moved forward with a call toward pastoral ministry. *Daniel Triller* (2009-2010)
- Liz (my wife) and I will graduate from Princeton Theological Seminary and will begin our search in January 2016 for a call sharing ministry in a small church as co-pastors. EPM introduced me to two things: Expositional preaching and the exegesis that helps shape those sermons. Exegesis is discovering the meaning that the text is trying to communicate through careful study of the original languages and historical context. *Dexter Kearney* (2012-13)
- At the end of my year, I got married. A few weeks later I moved to Princeton with Annika. My year with Earl confirmed my call to ministry and influenced my choice of seminary. Now I am in my first year at Princeton Theological Seminary. I've expressed this before, but I feel Earl has a gift of building up and mentoring other pastors and I see his influence/gifts spreading exponentially if he is able to continue and expand his role investing in current and future pastors. 
