- 4. What is the biggest barrier to leveraging your money on behalf of others?
- 5. With your Bible or YouVersion, read Mark 10:42-45. How would perceptions of the church change if Christians took to heart Jesus' command to serve instead of be served?
- 6. With your Bible or YouVersion, read John 13:13–17. What is one way that you can leverage your time, money, possessions, or influence on behalf of others?
