"Jesus the Prophet"

Summary

In our exploration of the prophetic grace, we've uncovered profound truths about creating environments where God's presence can flourish. The story of Saul and his messengers encountering Samuel's prophetic company (1 Samuel 19) illustrates how powerful these atmospheres can be in transforming hearts and minds. We're challenged to cultivate spaces - in our homes, churches, and communities - where worship, creativity, and the Holy Spirit's inspiration can flow freely. This isn't just about prophecy; it's about allowing God's perspective to permeate every aspect of our lives. As we embrace this grace, we may find ourselves becoming more sensitive to God's voice, more attuned to His plans, and more effective in bringing His Kingdom to earth. Let's consider how we can create these 'Naoths' - places of rest and divine habitation - in our own spheres of influence.

Main Points – Jesus the Prophet

Title: Cultivating the Prophetic Grace: Environments for God's Presence

Sermon Summary: This sermon explores the prophetic grace as one of the five-fold ministry gifts given by Jesus to the church. Small Group Guide: The Prophetic Grace

Opening Prayer:

Begin by thanking God for His prophetic grace and asking for open hearts to receive and discuss His word.

Key Takeaways:

Discussion Questions:

- 7. How might cultivating a prophetic environment in our homes or small groups look different from what we're currently doing?

Practical Applications:

- 1. This week, set aside 15-30 minutes each day to create a "prophetic environment" through worship, prayer, or meditation on Scripture. Journal any insights or impressions you receive.
- 2. Evaluate the "environment" of your home. Are there ways you can adjust it to be more conducive to hearing God's voice? (e.g., playing worship music, reducing distractions)
- 3. Practice "sitting in the counsel of the Lord" by spending time in silent reflection, asking God to speak to you about your life, family, or community.
- 4. If prophetic ministry interests you, discuss with your group leader or pastor how you might get involved or receive training in this area.

Closing Prayer:

Thank God for His desire to speak to us. Ask for grace to steward the prophetic gifts well and for discernment in applying what we've learned.

What role does worship play in creating an atmosphere where prophetic revelation can flow, and how can we incorporate this understanding into our gatherings?

How might our decision-making processes in church leadership change if we intentionally sought to involve all five ministry graces, including the prophetic?

In what ways can the prophetic grace help soften hardened hearts and bring transformation to individuals and communities?

How can we balance the need for structure and leadership with the desire for free-flowing, creative prophetic expression in our church services?

What are some practical steps we can take to 'sit in the counsel of the Lord' and cultivate a listening ear for His voice?

How might a renewed emphasis on the prophetic grace affect our approach to addressing societal issues and influencing our local communities?

In what ways can we honor and make space for prophetic ministry while also maintaining biblical discernment and accountability?

Devotional - Jesus the Prophet

5-day Bible reading plan and devotional guide:

Day 1: Cultivating a Prophetic Environment

Reading: 1 Samuel 19:18-24

Devotional: Today's passage illustrates the power of a prophetic environment. When Saul's messengers entered the presence of Samuel and the prophets, they were overcome by the Spirit of God. Even Saul himself was transformed when he entered this atmosphere.

Reflect on the environments you cultivate in your life. Are they conducive to hearing God's voice and experiencing His presence? Consider how you can create more space for worship, prayer, and listening to God in your daily routine. Perhaps start by playing worship music in your home or dedicating a specific time each day to sit quietly before the Lord.

Remember, our environments shape us. By intentionally fostering a prophetic atmosphere, we open ourselves to receive fresh inspiration and direction from God. Ask the Holy Spirit to help you become more sensitive to His presence and leading in your life.

Day 2: The Power of Worship Reading: 2 Kings 3:9-20

Devotional: In today's passage, we see the prophet Elisha calling for a musician before delivering God's message. This highlights the intimate connection between worship and prophecy. As the music played, the hand of the Lord came upon Elisha.

Worship has the power to shift atmospheres and prepare our hearts to hear from God. It's not just about singing songs, but about cultivating an attitude of reverence and adoration towards God. When we focus our attention on God's goodness and greatness, we become more attuned to His voice.

Today, challenge yourself to incorporate more intentional worship into your life. This could be through singing, playing an instrument, or simply speaking words of praise to God throughout your day. As you do, be expectant for God to speak to you and give you fresh insights for your situation.

Day 3: Standing in God's Counsel Reading: Jeremiah 23:16-22

Devotional: Jeremiah challenges false prophets who speak without having "stood in the counsel of the Lord." This reminds us of the importance of taking time to listen to God before we speak on His behalf.

In our fast-paced world, it's easy to rush into decisions or give advice without first seeking God's perspective. Today, practice the discipline of waiting on the Lord. Before important conversations or decisions, take a moment to pause and ask for God's wisdom.

Consider establishing a regular practice of "standing in God's counsel" through extended times of prayer and Bible study. As you do, you'll find yourself more aligned with God's heart and better equipped to speak His truth to others.

Day 4: The Prophetic and Leadership Reading: Acts 13:1-3

Devotional: Today's passage shows us how prophetic ministry and leadership work together in the church. As the leaders worshipped and fasted, the Holy Spirit spoke, giving direction for their next steps in ministry.

This reminds us that leadership in God's kingdom should always be Spirit-led. Whether you're in a formal leadership position or not, you have influence in various spheres of your life. How can you incorporate more listening to the Holy Spirit in your decision-making processes?

Pray for the leaders in your church and community today. Ask God to give them prophetic insight and the courage to follow His leading, even when it might be challenging or unconventional.

Day 5: Prophetic Grace for Transformation Reading: 1 Samuel 10:5-7

Devotional: In this passage, Samuel tells Saul that he will encounter a group of prophets and will be "turned into another man." This illustrates the transformative power of the prophetic anointing.

God's prophetic word has the power to change us from the inside out. It's not just about predicting the future, but about aligning our hearts with God's purposes. When we truly hear and receive God's word for our lives, we can't help but be transformed.

Reflect on times when you've experienced this kind of transformation through a prophetic word or encounter with God. How did it change your perspective or actions? Ask God to continue this work of transformation in your life, making you more like Jesus day by day.

Remember, all believers can cultivate a prophetic sensitivity to God's voice. As you conclude this devotional series, commit to staying open and attentive to how God might be speaking to you each day.

Danger: If we do not offer balanced fivefold ministry, the church will gravitate toward one or another extreme:

- The Evangelist tends to build a church focused exclusively on winning the lost, minimizing discipleship.
- The Prophet tends to build a legalistic church.
- The Teacher tends to build a theological church.
- The Pastor tends to build a social church.
- The Apostle tends to build a super-organized church.

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
