Day 1: God's Faithfulness to Israel and the Church

Reading: Romans 11:1-12

Reading: James 1:2-12

Devotional: The resilience of the Israeli people in the face of attacks and the courage of believers throughout history inspire us to stand firm in our faith. Trials can refine our character and deepen our dependence on God. Reflect on a current challenge you're facing. How might God be using this difficulty to strengthen your faith? Ask for His wisdom and endurance as you navigate this season.

Day 4: God's Plan for Redemption

Reading: Isaiah 62:1-12

Devotional: God's promise to restore Israel points to His larger plan of redemption for all humanity. He is working to bring about reconciliation and renewal, even when circumstances seem dire. Meditate on areas in your life or the world that seem hopeless. How can you align your prayers and actions with God's redemptive purposes? Commit to being an instrument of His peace and restoration in your sphere of influence.

Day 5: Preparing for Christ's Return

Reading: Matthew 25:1-13

Devotional: The anticipation of Christ's return should motivate us to live with purpose and urgency. Like the wise virgins in the parable, we must be ready at all times. Consider the state of your spiritual "oil." Are you cultivating a deep relationship with God that will sustain you through uncertain times? Reflect on practical ways you can stay vigilant and prepared,

such as regular prayer, Bible study, and acts of service. How can you share the hope of Christ's return with others?
