This challenges us to consider: Are we actively spreading the good news of God's reign in our daily lives? How can we be the 'beautiful feet' that bring hope and peace to a world in chaos?

# Main Points - How Beautiful Upon the Mountains

Sermon Summary: This sermon explores the biblical concept of "beautiful feet" that bring good news, as mentioned in Isaiah 52:7. Kevin emphasizes that all believers are called to be messengers of the gospel, which is not just about personal salvation but about proclaiming God's reign and bringing His peace to a troubled world. The sermon ties together themes of Jesus' ministry, the early church's proclamation, and the believer's role in continuing to spread the good news in today's context.

# Devotional - How Beautiful Upon the Mountains

### **Day 3: The Aroma of Christ**

Reading: 2 Corinthians 2:14-16

Devotional: Paul describes believers as the aroma of Christ, spreading the fragrance of His knowledge everywhere. This powerful metaphor reminds us that our lives should reflect the beauty and attractiveness of Christ to those around us. Just as a pleasant aroma can draw people in, our lives should draw others to Christ. Reflect on how your life might be spreading the fragrance of Christ. Are there areas where you might be giving off a different scent? Ask God to help you live in such a way that others are drawn to the beauty of Christ through your words, actions, and attitudes.

### Day 4: The Increase of His Government and Peace

Reading: Isaiah 9:6-7

Devotional: This familiar passage about the coming Messiah speaks of the endless increase of His government and peace. It's not just about a baby in a manger, but about the establishment of an eternal kingdom. As followers of Christ, we are part of this increasing kingdom. How can you participate in expanding Christ's reign of peace in your sphere of influence? Consider practical ways you can bring order, justice, and peace to your family,

workplace, or community. Ask God to show you how you can be an agent of His increasing government and peace today.

### **Day 5: Called to be Peacemakers**

Reading: Matthew 5:9, John 20:19-22

Devotional: Jesus blesses peacemakers and calls them children of God. After His resurrection, His first words to His disciples were "Peace be with you," followed by sending them out as the Father had sent Him. As followers of Christ, we are called and empowered to be peacemakers in a fractured world. This doesn't mean avoiding conflict, but actively working to bring reconciliation and healing. Reflect on areas in your life or community where peace is needed. How can you step into those situations as a peacemaker? Ask the Holy Spirit to fill you afresh, giving you the wisdom and courage to bring Christ's peace wherever you go.
