

“Hedieh Mirahmadi Falco Interview”

Summary

This powerful testimony takes us on a journey from spiritual bondage to glorious freedom in Christ. We witness a remarkable transformation from Islam to Christianity, revealing how God's relentless pursuit of His children transcends cultural barriers and religious traditions. The central message reminds us that salvation is instantaneous, but sanctification is a lifelong process of renewal. Drawing from Romans 12:2 about being transformed by the renewing of our minds, we're shown how God systematically breaks generational curses and strongholds when we surrender to Him. The testimony emphasizes 1 John 1:9's promise that God not only forgives our confessed sins but cleanses us from all unrighteousness—including the sins we don't even know about. What's particularly striking is the revelation that our personal transformation can end cycles of sin that have persisted for generations. This isn't just about individual salvation; it's about breaking chains that have bound our families for centuries. The kindness of God becomes the central theme—how His love, demonstrated through simple acts of grace and hospitality, becomes more powerful than any theological argument. We're challenged to be the hands and feet of Jesus, showing love without judgment, and sharing our testimonies rather than attacking others' beliefs. The message calls us to protect the next generation and recognize that our greatest battles are won first in our own homes and neighborhoods before extending to larger spheres of influence.

Small Group Study Guide – Hedieh Mirahmadi Falco Interview

Opening Prayer & Welcome (5 minutes)

Begin by thanking God for bringing your group together and ask the Holy Spirit to guide your discussion and open hearts to what He wants to reveal.

Icebreaker (10 minutes)

Question: Share a time when someone showed you unexpected kindness that made a lasting impact on your life. How did it change your perspective?

Discussion Questions

Part 1: Personal Transformation (15-20 minutes)

1. **Hedia described Islam as "a cage that comes down over you" with rituals but no real change.** How would you describe the difference between religious activity and genuine transformation in Christ?
2. **The Lord walked Hedia through breaking generational curses and strongholds.** What patterns or "family traditions" in your life might need to be surrendered to God? Are there behaviors you've inherited that don't align with Scripture?
3. **Read 1 John 1:9.** Hedia emphasized confessing not just our own sins but generational sins. How does this practice relate to spiritual freedom? Have you experienced breakthrough through this kind of prayer?

Part 2: Relationships & Marriage (15-20 minutes)

4. **Pastor Rob explained that godly marriages put Jesus and the Church on display for spiritual powers to see.** How does this perspective change the way you view marriage (whether your own or as a single person supporting married couples)?
5. **Hedia and Andy committed to model repentance and godly relationship for their children despite past brokenness.** What does it look like practically to show children what repentance and reconciliation look like in a home?
6. **For singles:** Hedia created a list of qualities she wanted in a spouse and prayed through it with God, who refined her list. How can single believers seek God's wisdom in relationships rather than settling or rushing?

Part 3: Engaging Muslims & Others (15-20 minutes)

7. **Hedia emphasized that missionaries understand showing love overseas but Christians often resist doing it in their own neighborhoods.** Why do you think we're more comfortable with missions "over there" than in our own backyard? What fears hold us back?
8. **The principle of "dog and bone vs. steak" was shared—we can't wrestle people's beliefs away, but we can offer something better.** How can you be "the fragrance of Christ" in your workplace, neighborhood, or family? What practical steps can you take this week?
9. **Hedia mentioned five common challenges Muslims raise about Christianity (Bible corruption, Trinity, Jesus' death, etc.).** How equipped do you feel to give gentle, respectful answers to basic questions about your faith? What resources could help you prepare?

Part 4: Protecting the Next Generation (15-20 minutes)

10. **"We can't fix anything else if we don't protect our children."** What specific threats do you see facing children and teens in your community? How can your small group support families in protecting and discipling the next generation?
11. **Hedia's friend asked her Muslim home health nurse, "Can I pray for you?" and now the woman asks for prayer regularly.** Who in your sphere of influence could you offer to pray for this week? How might this open doors for the gospel?
12. **The message emphasized knowing your "AOR" (Area of Responsibility)—your square miles.** What is your specific AOR? Who has God placed in your life that needs to encounter Jesus through you?

Practical Applications

This Week:

- Model repentance—if you've wronged your spouse or children, ask forgiveness this week
- Pray together as a family for your neighbors by name

Closing Prayer (5-10 minutes)

Prayer Focus:

- Thank God for His transforming power in our lives
- Pray for boldness to share Jesus with gentleness and respect
- Ask God to reveal any strongholds or generational patterns that need breaking
- Pray protection over the children and families in your group
- Lift up Hedia and Andy's ministry and potential government service
- Ask God to show each person their specific AOR and who they're called to reach

End with: Pray the blessing from the sermon over one another—that God would enlarge your steps, give you joy as your strength, and use you to refresh weary soldiers in the faith.

Reminder: The goal isn't to become experts in Islam but to become confident in sharing YOUR testimony of what Jesus has done in your life, prepared with basic answers about your faith, and committed to showing the love of Christ to everyone in your AOR.

Devotional – Hedieh Mirahmadi Falco Interview

Day 1: Breaking Generational Chains

Reading: 1 John 1:9; Exodus 20:5-6

Devotional: God's grace reaches back through generations to break patterns of sin and bondage. When we confess our sins—not just our own, but those inherited through family lines—God is faithful to cleanse us from all unrighteousness. Like Hedia discovered, our behavior is often influenced by patterns we didn't even know existed. But God says, "This ends with you." Today, ask the Holy Spirit to reveal any generational strongholds in your life. Confess them specifically, believing that Christ's blood breaks every curse. You have the power to change your family's spiritual trajectory. What patterns will you refuse to pass on to the next generation?

Day 2: The Kindness That Leads to Repentance

Reading: Romans 2:4; Titus 3:3-7

Devotional: It's not our arguments that win hearts—it's God's kindness displayed through us. Muslims in distant villages convert not because of theological debates, but because missionaries show them genuine love. A simple smile, an act of service, or a prayer offered in compassion can pierce through years of religious conditioning. God's kindness toward us while we were yet sinners is the model for our witness. Today, look for someone different from you—culturally, religiously, or socially. Show them unexpected kindness without agenda. Let them experience through you what God's love feels like. Remember: being nice is actually a powerful evangelistic strategy because it reflects the heart of Jesus.

Day 3: Defending What You Believe

Reading: 1 Peter 3:15-16; 2 Timothy 2:24-26

Devotional: Can you defend the authenticity of Scripture? Do you know why you trust the Bible? Our children and neighbors face challenges to their faith daily, and we must be prepared to answer with both truth and gentleness. The servant of the Lord must not strive but be gentle, apt to teach, patient. This doesn't mean being weak—it means being strong enough to remain kind under pressure. Spend time this week studying the reliability of Scripture, the evidence for Jesus' resurrection, and the historical basis of your faith. But remember: knowledge without love is just noise. Prepare your mind, but soften your heart. When someone questions your faith, see it as an invitation to share, not a battle to win.

Day 4: Protecting the Next Generation

Reading: Deuteronomy 6:4-9; Ephesians 6:4

Devotional: The greatest battleground of our time is the hearts and minds of our children. Every ideology—whether Marxist, Islamist, or secular—is targeting this generation. But God has given parents and spiritual leaders the primary responsibility to disciple young people. We cannot delegate this to schools or even church programs alone. Model repentance in your home. Demonstrate what a godly marriage looks like. Make church attendance non-negotiable. Create memories of faith that will anchor them when storms come. It requires intentionality. What specific steps will you take this week to spiritually fortify the children in your sphere of influence?

Day 5: Your Area of Responsibility

Reading: Acts 1:8; Matthew 28:18-20

Devotional: The macro problems in our nation stem from conquered micro-spaces—our homes, neighborhoods, and city councils. We cannot fix Washington if we haven't addressed what's happening on our street. Your area of responsibility (AOR) is the square miles around you. Start there. Invite that Muslim neighbor for tea. Attend your school board meeting. Pray over your city. Vote in local elections. Disciple your children. The Great Commission begins in Jerusalem—your immediate context—before extending to the ends of the earth. God isn't calling everyone to national platforms, but He is calling everyone to faithfulness in their assigned territory. What is your AOR, and what is one action you can take this week to advance God's kingdom there?
