Title: Accessing Resurrection Power in the Present

- 3. Comfort Food Fast: Identify one "comfort food" (metaphorical or literal) that you tend to turn to instead of God. Choose to fast from it for a set period, replacing it with prayer or Bible study.

- 4. Resurrection Testimonies: Share with the group next week about a time you experienced God's "resurrection power" in a practical situation in your life.
- 5. Daily Bread Prayer: Each morning this week, pray for your "daily bread," focusing on trusting God for that day's needs rather than anxiously planning for the future.

Closing Prayer:

Lord, thank you for the power of your resurrection available to us today. Help us to look beyond our natural circumstances and access the supernatural resources you provide. Give us the courage to surrender our "comfort foods" and trust in your provision. May we walk in the reality of your resurrection power this week. In Jesus' name, Amen.

Devotional - Because He Lives

Here's a 5-day Bible reading plan and devotional guide:

Day 1: Encountering the Risen Christ

Reading: Luke 24:13-35

Devotional: Just as Jesus appeared to the disciples on the road to Emmaus, He desires to reveal Himself to us in our everyday lives. Often, we're so focused on our disappointments and struggles that we fail to recognize His presence. Today, reflect on times when you may have missed Jesus walking alongside you. Day 2: From Death to Life

Reading: Romans 8:5-11

Consider areas in your life where you've been operating from a "flesh" mindset, focused on fear, doubt, or self-reliance. How can you intentionally shift your thinking to align with the Spirit today? Ask God to help you tap into His resurrection power, bringing new life to dead situations and renewing your mind with His truth.

Day 3: Comfort in Suffering

Reading: 2 Corinthians 4:7-18

Devotional: Our afflictions and weaknesses are not obstacles to experiencing God's power - they're opportunities. Paul describes how our struggles allow Christ's life to be revealed in us. Reflect on a current difficulty you're facing. Instead of asking God to remove it, ask Him to show you how He wants to demonstrate His strength through your weakness. How might this situation be an avenue for God's glory to shine through you to others?

Day 4: Unshakeable Hope

Reading: Romans 8:31-39

Devotional: Nothing can separate us from God's love - not tribulation, distress, persecution, or any other hardship. This promise isn't just about feeling loved; it's about being more than conquerors through Christ. Consider a circumstance where you feel defeated or overwhelmed. How does knowing you're inseparably united with Christ's love change your perspective? Ask God to anchor your hope in His unfailing love, enabling you to face any challenge with confidence.

Day 5: Living in Resurrection Reality

Reading: Ephesians 1:15-23

Devotional: The same power that raised Christ from the dead is at work in believers. Yet often, we live far below this incredible potential. Paul prays for the Ephesians to have the

eyes of their hearts enlightened to know this hope and power. Today, echo Paul's prayer for yourself. Ask God to give you a fresh revelation of the resurrection power available to you. How might your daily life look different if you truly lived from this place of spiritual authority and strength? Commit to taking one step of faith today that requires you to rely on Christ's power within you.
